
Under thatch, amid dark beams, they sup their drink and dream their dreams, of fun and frolics - perhaps a duel. They might even beat 'The Bull' at pool.

THE CHRISTMAS CABARET

Each year, it's interesting to see how the cabaret manages to entertain with amazing freshness. The magic formulae of good quality food, cheap but tolerable wine, and inspired adult entertainment has stood the test of time.

Of course, subtle changes are introduced each year but these only ever seem to amount to altering when the food is served or the position of the stage. The ever popular blend of good humour, popular songs and short innovative sketches has remained essentially unchanged for several years; and long may it do so.

That such varied talent exists to enable two shows (usually) to be put on each year in a village as small as ours, is in itself surprising and something to be proud of. Judging from conversations I have had, this certainly impresses the increasing number of 'outsiders' who come along.

Its popularity with audiences seems confirmed by the fact that the same people tend to put their names down for tickets at the merest hint of another Cabaret being arranged. This year was no different. All tickets were sold back in October, just as the first sketches were being written.



For the latest cabaret, it was decided that the excellent hot & cold

buffet prepared by Francesca Bean and Jackie Coats should be served before the show started - a popular decision amongst those of us who had had little opportunity to eat earlier on in the day. A bonus was that so much food had been prepared that a good cold buffet was also available in the interval.

Nigel Palmer supplied most of the music on his (or was it Neil's) keyboard with Lol providing the prerecorded backings. Neil had as usual 'strung the show together' and even appeared on stage in sketches, additionally singing two rather bizarre songs. The Branckers produced and performed a very funny version of "Ah! Yes, I remember it well" with John also giving a fine rendition of Flanders and Swan's 'Hippopotamus' song.

Despite several attempts, nobody was able to prevent John Whyte from singing various songs and at the end he even led the now obligatory 'community singing'.

This time the songs had a definite Scottish flavour; whether this was to match his own origins or the approaching Burns Night we couldn't tell (perhaps it was just the scotch).

Many of us hoped that well loved group 'The Bristols' would make an appearance again this year. However, 'the management' had decided to replace them with Aston Abbotts own ABBA (with the glamour being provided by Anne Brancker & Sharon Wilkinson) and it has to be said they were every bit as good. 'The Gambolinis' made another appearance demonstrating the benefits of keeping fit and introducing Linda Sutton in her first cabaret appearance.

Just about the most unusual sight of the evening was to see Neil appear as a boy scout and sing a quite hilarious song entitled 'Be Prepared'. Margaret Kent, well remembered for her rendition of a Cinzano advert in

one of the Christmas shows several years ago, gave an extremely creditable impersonation of Pam Aires delivering her poem called 'Throw another leg on the fire mother'. This was made all the more amazing since she had taken the trouble to learn it off by heart.

Dave Lewis (who had spent most of the day wiring up all the lighting etc.) made his second cabaret appearance as the resident 'stand up comedian'. Just where he gets his material from, nobody knows, but it's pretty certain he will be asked to return with more of the same.

Finally, I have absolutely no intention of telling you what 'The Men in hats' sketch (as performed by Ray, Tony and John Whyte) was about because it was far too rude. Suffice it to say, if you weren't there you missed out on a jolly good laugh.

Even though as compere I had to 'sing for my supper', it was one of those occasions which one just didn't want to come to an end. Mind you, with any luck, it's quite possible that following the Christmas break 'the management' will be unable to curb their enthusiasm and will be thinking about putting a Chronicle cabaret together for the spring.

If you don't want to miss this event then I recommend you speak to one of our well known thespians and book your self a ticket straight away!.



RECTOR'S REPORT -JANUARY 1999

Only one more Christmas this Millennium! and I bet that we shall get heartily sick of being reminded. The hype will be in overdrive - so I hope that you will have enjoyed this Christmas and I wish you every blessing for 1999.

As our three Parishes have been linked together as a United Benefice for 25 years, we have been looking to see what we have achieved during that period and at areas where we can work together more effectively in the

future. There is, of course, nothing new there - because, like life, the Church is in a constant state of change.

One of the areas that is being looked at is the pattern of Sunday Services which has remained much the same for the last twenty years. What was 'right' then is not necessarily 'right' now - because the world we live in has changed dramatically over that period. How do you arrange for each of three churches to have a balanced and regular pattern of worship each month - catering for as many needs as possible, and whilst being restricted by Church Law?

The trouble is that at the slightest hint of change, people become very defensive about what they already have. Is this a potential threat to 'our' Church?

Having worked in Village Churches for more than twenty years, I am a passionate believer that each community needs its Church - however few people use it on a regular basis. I also know the heartache and soul-searching that goes on by regular congregations to keep the church building in a moderate state of repair, and the

difficulty of persuading the Village community that the Church is there to be valued and used (and that it costs 'real' money to keep it open).

I may as well do my Millennium plug now - The Millennium reminds us of the change from 1900s to 2000s - and we look back to that other change from BC to AD - the Birth of Jesus Christ. As part of the Millennium celebrations, the Church will be delivering candles to each household (as a reminder that Jesus is the light of the World). It is hoped that these candles will feature in local candle lit processions focusing on the Parish Church (or at the local Millennium celebration).

In 1999, December 31st will be on a Friday - and (whilst that may be a poor link), it does remind us that Jesus and the Church are not just for Sundays. In many Churches this has happened for many years. For the last couple of years we have had a Service at 10.00 on Wednesday mornings, in a different location each week. Apart from the first Wednesday in the month, when we have Prayer Book Communion, this is a short and informal service lasting about 20 minutes. At this we pray for the people who live in these villages, and the things that are going on. You are very welcome to come and join us, if you are free. If you cannot come, we will be very pleased to remember you and your concerns in our prayers.

The following meeting is at 2.45pm on January 28th when June Brown will tell us about "parchment craft".


