
We look forward to getting to know you all and to seeing you at our various village functions.

ASTON ABBOTTS GOES FETE CRAZY!

Many CHRONICLE readers came along to the fete this year and hopefully enjoyed the CHRONICLE display by the bar-b-q stand. To remind you of what a great day it was we have a number of articles in this month's magazine, including this one from the Bucks Herald:

Glorious sunshine brings out crowds at fete

THERE was no shortage of demand for ice cream at Aston Abbotts village fete on Saturday, though the persuasive sales pitch of the burger sellers did a good job in competition.

The fete centred on the village green which gave it a warm and accessible atmosphere with visitors strolling round in the brilliant sunshine.

And the boisterous cries of the barbecue chefs, including the editor of the village magazine, The Chronicle, who were frying under the sun, added to the lively atmosphere.

Stalls selling ornaments, plants and books drew huge crowds while traditional side

shows like the skittles and coconut shys added colour without being tacky.

In a field behind the green there was a children's play area with a stall from the village playgroup and swings and toy train rides.

The event is held every year and is obviously a good omen weather-wise as they have sold out of ice cream now for two years running.

All proceeds go towards village organisations like the church and toddlers group. Fete committee member Jackie Farrands told the Herald: "We raised more than £2,100, which we are very pleased with – it's only a small village of about 300 people."

IT'S WAR ON SPEEDING CARS IN BUCKS....

Many of you will be familiar with the ongoing battle to limit speeding in local villages and on the notorious A418.

Following yet another fatal accident on the A418, the Aston Abbotts Parish Council is going to confront the problem and is making its views known to local MPs and the Highways Department.

Of course, we can all do our bit by observing speed limits (and remember the limits are the *maximum* allowed) and by being extra vigilant when driving through the villages.

TWO NEW SPEED CARS ARE BECOMING A FAMILIAR SIGHT ON THE ROADS IN BUCKS.

The cars, provided by Bucks County Council and operated by Thames Valley Police are a continuation and extension of the successful partnership between the two authorities.

They are used solely for speed

enforcement purposes throughout the County and are equipped with the latest speed enforcement technology including mobile speed cameras.

The Speed Cars enable the Police to plan and undertake their speed enforcement activities much more effectively as they can rely on a vehicle always being available. Early indications are that the Speed Cars are raising the profile of the County Council working with TVP to reduce speed and road casualties.

CHILDHOOD MEMORIES

The beginning of July was a special birthday for me and the day turned out to be really special. I was told not to plan anything for that afternoon so I had a few friends round for morning coffee including my sister who is over from New Zealand. Tony, Frances and I set off at about 1.15pm to pick Diane up at Wing - she came out laden with picnic hampers and we set off.

By this time and direction of route, I had guessed we were off to the village of Harlestone about 5 miles north of Northampton, where Frances and I spent the early years of our life during the war on our bachelor great Uncle's and two maiden great Aunts' farm.



Harlestone is quite a unique village in that it is in two separate parts, Upper and Lower Harlestone with one road connecting the two on the outskirts and a narrow asphalt path across ¾ mile of park land in the middle. Harlestone was on the Spencer Estate, as were all the surrounding villages.

Upper Harlestone still has a tiny shop/Post Office as part of a house, a dovecote and laundry, and used to have a butcher's shop whilst at the other end there is the Church, Village School (still open) and there used to be a bakery and forge. We parked near the Post Office and walked across the fields which our Uncle used to farm and is now a golf course.

The Sweet Chestnut trees are still there where we used to throw sticks up to dislodge the chestnuts; the lake at one side, about ½ mile long, where we used to skate nearly every winter with its seven arch bridge at one end. We used to walk this path to the school and back for dinner, then back again - it is about ¾ of a mile each way.

We found a shady spot under a tree - it was a gloriously



hot sunny day and we unpacked the picnic. Diane had supplied a superb birthday lunch of smoked salmon, prawns and every delicacy you could think of, all laid out on a nice cloth.

We ate our fill, packed up and went in to the Church yard to see some of the family graves, then down a lane past the rectory where the village fete

what used to be held and on to the school. We went in to the playground - what used to seem a steep slope that made an icy slide now seems fairly flat (perhaps they've levelled it). We met a lady who we remembered as children and who remembered us, just back from an outing - she is 100 years old. I think she must be the only remaining tenant.

We wandered back over the fields, had a welcome ice cream from the shop, and down another lane to look at Church Farm which was our home. All the houses are built of the local sandstone - that was the same but everything else had altered; the cow sheds where I first learnt to milk a cow; the granary where we played hide and seek; everything has gone, all turned into flats and houses. The farm track down the field to the house is now a sweeping gravel drive. The stone walls are still there along which we always walked instead of along the road. Frances and I can still name a lot of Uncle's fields - Foothill, Lumleys, Spellbrook.

I have been back a few times over the years but this was only the second time Frances had visited since she left this country over forty years ago, so it was a lovely idea of Diane's and the best birthday present she could have given me. Thank you to Diane, and to Tony for taking us and putting up with all our childhood reminiscences.

THE GREAT FETE

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

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IN THE VILLAGE 4.

SAFETY ON THE A418

FROM WINGRAVE CROSSROADS TO THE NEW ROUNDABOUT AT WING

At the recent Parish Council meeting the latest fatal accident on the A418 was discussed. This tragedy brings the total number of fatalities on this dangerous stretch of road to ten in the past three years.

During this time NO action has been taken by the responsible authorities to improve the driving conditions or safety on this part of the A418, a situation the Parish Council now finds intolerable. We cannot afford to wait for money to become available for a by-pass - action needs to be

taken NOW to improve matters.

The Parish Council will be writing to the Highways Authority again and putting pressure on our County Councillor and MP. The more fuss we can make the sooner action will be taken to improve the situation.

If you would like to join the campaign to make the A418 safer, please write to the County Council to express your concerns. Although the letter should be in your own words, some of the key points to make are -

- Introduction of a new speed limit on the whole stretch of the A418 between Wingrave cross-roads and Wing, backed up by effective police enforcement.
- Siting of a speed camera somewhere along the road (perhaps move the camera currently in the 30mph limit in Wing).
- Painting of double white lines all the way from Wingrave cross-roads to Wing to impose a new 'no overtaking' law.
- Routine gritting of the A418 during icy or frosty weather.

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



A/9911544/APP Conservatory 1, Norduck Cott's, Moat Lane, Aston Abbotts. After due consideration the Parish Council had no comments to make on this application.

e Highways

A418 - the most recent fatal accident on the road between Wingrave cross-roads and Wing has brought the total deaths during the past 3 years to ten. Resolved to write to the Highways Authority, Local MP(John Bercow) and Transport Minister requesting immediate action to improve safety on this section of road. Measures asked for will include:-

a) Double white lining to form a 'no overtaking' zone on the whole stretch b) New speed limit of 5Omph, enforced by police patrols c) Siting of a new speed camera.

Urban grass cutting - a map has been issued by BCC showing the areas of the village contained in their grass cutting contract. It will be checked for accuracy.

English Basketball Association Outdoor Initiative. The Parish Council considers the offers put forward by this Association are worth looking at. It will be discussed more fully at the next Recreation Ground Committee meeting.

VALE VOLUNTEERS

Are you retired, between jobs or a full-time homemaker? Do you have a little time to spare? If you can answer 'yes' to these questions then you are the sort of person Vale Volunteers would love to hear from!

Vale Volunteers is the volunteer agency for this area. It exists to assist local charities and not-for-profit organisations to find helpers. At present the need is very great - 230 groups in Aylesbury Vale are currently looking for additional unpaid help. What they seek covers a very wide range indeed, from people able to pop in to see a house bound neighbour for Age Concern, to those with specialised skills such as computing, complementary therapies or accounting. There is no upper age limit, everyone who is willing and able to give time will be seriously considered.

One of the obstacles to volunteering for people living in a rural location may be inadequate transport facilities, but there are a number of opportunities in all but the smallest places. Help is needed by many village schools with the Government's literacy initiative: giving about an hour once a week to listen to young readers. Schools are often also keen to find Governors and Parent/Teacher Association helpers. In addition, Rainbows and Brownies, Beavers and Cubs, youth clubs and sports clubs all welcome (and need) help.

For those who can travel, it's good to know that the vast majority of groups looking for volunteers will pay a mileage rate, or reimburse bus fares. There are so many volunteer opportunities in Aylesbury and Buckingham that it is impossible to list more than a representative few. Work with babies, children, animals, office work, shop work, driving, advice giving, environmental activities; the list goes on and on. There are opportunities in the day time, during the evening and at weekends, and whatever you choose you will have the satisfaction of knowing that giving your time is making a real difference in the community.

Volunteering is not just a one way process. Obviously the organisation which is being helped gains your time, skills and enthusiasm, but as a volunteer you can also find your life enriched by new friendships and interests, and what you learn may also help you to find paid employment if that is a longer term objective.

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

GUIDANCE ON GUNS

A member of the public reported to the Parish Council that they had witnessed someone walking in the village with a gun. Although the type of gun was not identified, I was asked to make clear the rules and laws that apply to shotguns.

- It is illegal to posses a shotgun without a valid shotgun certificate
- o It is illegal to have a loaded shotgun in a public place
- Provided a shotgun certificate is held, there is no restriction on possession between the ages of 15 and 17, but a shotgun may not be bought or hired
- Although there is no lower age limit for granting of a certificate, a child under 15 can only possess a shotgun if under the supervision of a person aged 21 or over, or if the gun is covered with a securely fastened gun cover to prevent firing
- It is an offence for a person under 15 to have with them an assembled shotgun other than in the above circumstances. It is also an offence to make a gift of a shotgun to a person under the age of 15
- Always transport a shotgun in its case or in a protective gun cover. It is not acceptable practice to carry an uncovered gun in a public place

Further information about shotguns and the law is available from BASC (British Association for shooting and conservation), Marford Hill, Rossett, Wrexham, LL12 DH6.

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

RECTOR'S REPORT -SEPTEMBER 1999

There is an old saying that, "if you don't like the heat, get out of the kitchen".

We have certainly enjoyed some heat this summer. We have had some days of wall to wall sunshine – although a couple of cloudy and wet days soon makes us forget them. By nature I am not a great lover of hot, sunny weather.

The brochures produced many years ago by the Railway for "Holidays in England"

used to often describe the weather as "mild, equable, and bracing". This was probably a polite way of saying that it could probably be rather chilly, with some rain and a fair degree of wind.

But I think that the saying about heat referred more to the pressure than the temperature. When the weather is warm we like to take things at a slower pace. OLD WATER PUMPS

an article by Colin Higgs, CHRONICLE History writer

As water pumps were in common use in backyards of houses and placed at convenient points in the squares or greens of

towns and villages, grave risks to health from pollution were common.

A survey in 1849 reported that water drawn from a well behind an Aylesbury inn was at times very foul and unfit to drink, but that on the other hand the pump that had been put in at Kingsbury in 1838 served very good water.

Water pumps were made of Elm, which stood immersion in water for long periods; wooden pumps also had an advantage over iron pumps as they rarely froze in winter.

In 1849 the local board of

health erected six pumps in Aylesbury at Whitehall Street, Oxford Road, Back Buckingham Street, Upper Hundreds, Walton Street and Castle Street. A good specimen of an old pump can be seen to this day in Pebble Lane, Aylesbury and

has a plaque explaining its origin.


Another very old pump (1785) can be found in Old Amersham against the wall of the ancient Town Hall. Some pumps even had ornamental shelters such as the one at Mentmore.

Many hand worked pumps are still used today and many have been removed from backyards leaving a legacy of old wells.

Our local village pumps in Church Row, Wingrave Road and New Zealand Cottages still exist to this day.




