### In The Village

### **Draft Development Brief**

### Weedon Hill Major Development Area

he draft AVDC Local Plan contains proposals for four major development areas to provide much of the required growth of housing and employment in the District up to 2011. The Parish Council has been asked to comment on the draft development plan for the Weedon Hill MDA – this will, on completion, cover 50 acres with a possible 850 new houses.

Aston Abbotts Parish Council has made the following comments:

- 1. This new development will generate a lot of extra traffic and, although the report mentions traffic access to the town centre, the A41 and Oxford Road, no mention is made of the impact this would have on surrounding villages. There is concern that Weedon, Lines Hill and Moat Lane, Aston Abbotts will be used as a rat run to Milton Keynes and Leighton Buzzard Station. This 'gated' road is little more than a single-track country lane, which is already extremely busy during the rush hour, with many vehicles travelling at excessive speed for the road conditions.
- 2. The Parish Council cannot see evidence of sufficient provision in the highways structure to carry the additional traffic in the adjoining rural area. We would like to see a more positive plan in position to prevent the above scenario from occurring.
- We would like to meet a representative of your organisation on site to discuss the above comments in more detail.

This issue will be discussed further at the next Parish Council meeting.





### The Bull and Butcher Roundabout



The diagram above shows the roundabout that is proposed to be constructed in front of the Bull and Butcher. I have added the dotted lines to show the approximate position of the current road edges and road markings.

A rumour to the effect that the Bull and Butcher planning application had been turned down was circulating in early March. This is not the case and the application is alive and kicking.

As previously reported in The Chronicle the application was 'suspended' awaiting clarification of certain points from the architects Tempietto, who have now submitted additional plans showing the elevations of the proposed houses.

In addition Tempietto have made further comments on the viability of the pub and also addressed comments made by the Highways authority. The proposed amendments to the plans include:

- 1. Introducing a mini roundabout at the junction with The Green.
- 2. Increasing the size of the turning head within the development.
- 3. Introducing 3 parking bays adjacent to the six flats
- 4. Confirming the size of the parking bays and the access road.

Of these, it is the roundabout that has the greater impact, as it would be built in front of The Old Cottage and the shop.

The junction would undergo substantial alteration and it seems that parking for the shop and The Old Cottage might be lost. This could be a blow for the shop if people can't stop to pop in for their drink, snack or whatever. It also appears that there is a slight chicane as Wingrave Road emerges into the roundabout, but this just may be poor drawing. And therein lies the rub. The plan that has been submitted has no actual measurements to confirm the exact size and placing of the roundabout. Nor is it known if the roundabout is to be a raised surface, or just a painted circle on the road over which vehicles can drive.

By overlaying the road layout from the original plan we can see that the roundabout appears to straddle the current stop line where The Green emerges into Wingrave Road. The construction of the new kerbs and the change to the road layout would clearly create a major change at this junction.

The Parish Council have responded by calling an extraordinary Council meeting to seek the views of the village and formulate a response. Unfortunately, at

the time of writing it is still several days away and so I am unable to report upon its outcome.

So what do you think? Initially it might appear to calm traffic, but is it really right to build a mini-roundabout right in front of a 16th century thatched cottage in a conservation area? Is it in keeping with the character of the village? Do other rural Buck villages need roundabouts?

If you like the idea then please remember this roundabout comes only as part of the Bull and Butcher redevelopment package.



### **Aston Abbotts Parish Council**

Unofficial minutes from the meeting held on 27th February 2002

The meeting was chaired by Cllr John Sansome. Present were Councillors G. Kempster, R. Clarke and Mrs K. Curry (Parish Clerk) Cllr M. Kent, PC Buckle and County Cllr B. Jennings sent apologies. Two members of the public attended the meeting. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and signed as a true record and there were no matters arising.

#### **Cierk's Report**

The Clerk thanked the Parish Council for funding her attendance at the recent two-day course run by BALC, which she found most useful.

A letter has been sent to the developers, Smith Latimer, in response to their offer to the village to buy part of the Bull and Butcher, saying that we were unable to publicise their offer within the given time limit.

Highways have agreed to move the 'Kill Your Speed' sign in Moat Lane and place it with the village name sign on Lines Hill. They are only prepared, however, to give the request for a 30 mph limit in Moat Lane a low priority status.

Items for discussion at the next meeting will include the nomination of a Governor for Wingrave CE Combined School, transport grants for projects within the village and the adoption of the new Ethical Framework.

#### County Council, District Council & Police Matters

No representatives of the above were present. However, concern was expressed at the new reduced level of police

presence at Wing (down from 8 officers to 4), and it was noted that the lay-by on the A418 has still to be cleaned following the departure of the travellers.

#### **Comments From The Floor**

Comments were received regarding the generally poor state of local road surfaces, and on the proposed extension at 1, Longmoor Barns.

#### Planning

02/00121/APP 1, Longmoor Barns, Cublington Road, Aston Abbotts. Single storey rear extension. Resolved to make the following comments:

- a) The original planning consent for the barns stated that no extra appendages may be added. A previous application to add a porch to one of the barns was rejected, and the Council feels that, should this one be granted, it would set a precedent.
- b) The extension would adversely affect the open appearance and character of the AAL, contravening RA 25 and RA4 of the Local Plan.

02/00332/APP Wingrave Road Transmitting Station. Installation of new 20m telecommunications tower to replace existing. Resolved to oppose the application on the grounds that the new tower would be 5m higher than the existing one.

01/00409/APP Oxleys Farm Conversion of barn to dwelling. (Development control committee, 2nd hearing). This application has now been approved.

### The Bedford & Milton Keynes Waterways Trust

Many of you will have heard or read the press reports about British Waterways' ambitious project to construct a new canal. However, some of you may be unaware that this venture once had a local connection.

The route mentioned in the recent press reports—the favoured one of nine options—will link the River Great Ouse in Bedford with Three Locks near Soulbury. This is not the first time such a scheme has been proposed. Brewer and MP Samuel Whitbread tried to get just such a link constructed in 1810 but the plan foundered for lack of investment. Another attempt in 1892 also was abandoned for similar reasons. If this project goes ahead it will cost between £80m and £150m and it will be the first new canal construction in Britain for 100 years.

If it seems a little bizarre to be building canals in the 21<sup>st</sup> century then let me assure you that there is a method behind this madness. It is projected that the new canal will create some 500 permanent jobs in the tourist and recreational industries as it attracts an expected 1.5 million additional visitors to the area. This is in addition to the 280-440 temporary jobs created during the construction phase.

It is not just the creation of jobs that is important. There is the obvious environmental benefit of a substantial new wildlife haven that will become a welcome natural habitat for waterfowl and the many other creatures that usually rely upon rivers and streams.

Conservationists are getting excited about the possibility of attracting the red vole back to the area, whilst pond-owners (like myself) are somewhat less enthusiastic about the probable increase in the heron population!

The 20-mile route will pass through both Beds and Bucks countryside and involve some 13 locks, all of traditional wood and brick construction. This is where the story gets an interesting twist. In Beds a lock can have a maximum depth (the height between the upper and lower pounds) of 11 feet 8 inches, whilst in Bucks a byelaw enacted in 1823 restricts canal locks (those on man-made canals, not locks on canalised rivers) to just 7 feet and 4




inches. This is not of any great significance on the favoured route, but it had a major impact on the original, bolder plan.

When Patrick Cunnel, British Waterways' constructional director, first put the idea of a new canal to the British Waterways board in 1993, his original proposal was for a canal some 14 miles longer than currently proposed. This would have linked directly from Bedford to Aylesbury. It was not going to be just a tourist attraction; being broader than the current Aylesbury arm it would also have had commercial significance as a working waterway.

A first attempt at planning the route had to be abandoned because it fell foul of

a major government-backed housing scheme that was then under discussion, but eventually a tentative route was settled upon and this would have seen the canal come closer to home than many of you might expect. The original plan followed much the same route as is currently planned from the River Great Ouse to Three Locks, but then it would have continued southwest passing between Soulbury and Wing, finally passing north of Aston Abbotts on its way to Aylesbury.


This is where the problem with lock depths scuppered the plan. Cunnel appealed three times to Buckinghamshire County Council for a repeal of the byelaw limiting lock depths in Bucks, but without success. Being forced to restrict lock depths to a maximum of just 7 foot 4 inches meant that after passing between The Abbey and Norduck Farm a system of at least 19 locks would have had to have been constructed down Lines Hill before the canal finally terminated in the lake at Watermead. Environmental impact fears and spiralling costs effectively killed the scheme, although it would have been the most imaginative engineering project



So British Waterways fell back upon the current more achievable plan and the opportunity to attract tourism to Aston Abbotts was lost. However, it would have been a much longer-term project with the canal eventually opening, coincidentally, exactly fifteen years after the official publication date of this issue of The Chronicle. So that would have been on the first day of April in 2017 then. A little too far in the future perhaps.

### **Designed By A Man!**

Putting it bluntly, I'm not the world's most enthusiastic housewife. It could be said that I am a founder member of Sluts Anonymous. I just can't see the point of spending my entire life chasing every last speck of dust since the day after I die it will all be getting dirty again. There are far more rewarding ways of spending my time with longer lasting results to show for my efforts. My house is clean enough to be healthy and messy enough to be home.

Why spend all day making the place look spotless and uncomfortably tidy when none of the other occupants will even notice? And within five minutes of their return home there will be a trail of crisp packets, mud, newspapers, empty coke cans, briefcases, dirty clothes, washing up etc. everywhere they go. So why bother?

You could say that this behaviour shows that I've failed as a mother as well. I should have brought them up to care about such things and to appreciate my efforts to provide them with a beautifully tidy and scrupulously hygienic environment, but at least this way we have remained friends. And the house has often been full of their friends who feel comfortable here (and have added considerably to the "lived in" feel of the place). To be honest, I'd rather have the fun of their company than an empty show home.

However, once in a while I get a rush of blood to the head and I have this uncontrollable urge to deal with some of the scruffier parts of my home, and everything goes hang while I perch precariously on ladders with paint and brushes. To me a room is only clean when the paint is still wet. With three men and two dogs in my life I know better than to expect it to last longer than it takes to wash out the brushes.

Usually I enjoy this activity but not when I decide to attack the kitchen because that has to be a really thorough job — not just the walls, ceiling, doors and windows, but the insides of all the cupboards and all the contents. It can take days while all the work surfaces are covered with the contents of the cupboards and gradually my irritation turns to anger then to full blown fury as I clean each item thoroughly before putting it away. "Why?" I hear you ask.

Well, whenever I use an item I give it a wipe over before putting it away but inevitably the grime does build up in those hard to reach places. And there are so many hard to reach places on the average piece of kitchen equipment, and most of them are TOTALLY UNNECESSARY.

As anyone with half a brain knows, kitchens are supposed to be hygienic. It is also well known that, unlike other rooms, they do not just collect dust — the very nature of cooking means that the atmosphere deposits grease and moisture on every surface and into every nook and cranny, gluing the dust to everything in the process. So, logically speaking, you would expect designers of kitchen equipment to bear in mind that some poor mug has got to keep it all clean — well, clean enough to avoid food poisoning at least. You would expect them to try to make everything easy to clean in order to minimise the risks of mass epidemics of Delhi Belly.

But, oh no, quite the opposite. If they can find a way of introducing another nook onto an electric kettle, they will. They obviously think that a toaster won't do the job properly unless it beats the existing world record for crannies. Have a good look at your appliances and marvel at the designer's triumph of elegant but unhygienic imagination. Aren't there a

whole load of unnecessary moulded grooves which are supposed to make it look more attractive — the equivalent of "go faster stripes" on a car — but are totally stomach churning when you notice the lines of black dirt wedged into the corners? Dirt that will need hours of chiselling with a knife and scrubbing with an old tooth brush to remove?

Obviously, electrical appliances must have knobs and switches but it cannot be beyond the wit of man to design them without the totally inaccessible area tucked behind them. And it must be possible, given the advanced state of

plastics technology, to design a fridge door handle, which is a smooth, flowing line curving out from the door — moulded all of a piece with the door — no right angle corners, no decorative trim, no unnecessary dirt traps.

I realise that the slots in the casing of a hand held mixer are important for ventilation, but they get filthy and one can hardly give them a long soak in hot soapy water as sluicing electric motors is not a desperately good idea. And which complete moron designed a toasted sandwich maker with cooking plates that cannot be removed for cleaning? The brilliance of that one leaves me speechless at times. Even a waste bin is a miracle of inaccessible crevices which collect — well, I won't continue on that topic as I don't want to upset any delicate stomachs.

But there is one final *bête noir* for me. Who, may I ask, invented that dimpled, orange peel effect that is used for so many things from work surfaces to kettles? Did they never think that wiping the surface with a damp cloth would just embed the dirt into the minute crevices, turning the item firstly gunge grey and then bacteria black?

Now, to bring the relevance of the title of this piece to bear upon the text, let me explain that the majority of work in the average kitchen, even in this age of enlightenment, is done by women. Furthermore, it is patently obvious that the majority of designers of kitchenware do not actually use it on a daily basis, let alone clean it. Therefore, it follows as night follows day, kitchenware designers are men.

### A Sundream Holiday—The Concluding Part

#### Tuesday 27th November

After a night of 'rock and roll' (nothing to do with Bill Haley – just the ship 'hitting' some rough weather), we were pleased to see the sun rise at 6.35. An early breakfast on the sun deck coincided with our sailing into Nassau harbour, berthing once again alongside the cruise ship 'Fantasy'. Leaving the ship at 10.00, we, and about 200 other passengers had to walk a good mile through the docks before boarding another ship called 'Calypso'. This was to take us to Blue Lagoon Island.. The Bahamas is made up of some 700 islands but only 16 are inhabited. ### Boys' Toys

don't think I'm the only chap in the village who enjoys high tech gadgetry. It's my particular male vice. Cars? Take 'em or leave 'em. Cricket? Yawn! Football? Oh sorry - did I drop off for a moment there? But show me a gleaming chunk of high-tech electronic gadgetry with flashing coloured lights and a remote control the size of a paperback book—then you can be sure of my full and undivided attention.

Recently someone mentioned to me how at one time he would go to the Bull on a Friday night, nip home at ten to watch Frasier, and then pop back to the pub. Now this is what video recorders are for. But let's face it, how many of you reading this can actually program the timer on your video? What can you actually do if a program you want to see is on when you just can't watch it? I suspect most of you would be faced with two alternatives in this situation: attempt to decipher the video's instruction book, if you didn't throw it out with the packaging, or bribe a tame 6 year old to program it for you. Sorry folks—those of you with an IQ of less than 130 and no young children are going to miss the program.

The video in our house always has been strictly my preserve. Mrs Ed leaves it to me to tame and control the complicated apparatus and also to sort out the required tape from the untidy pile of poorly labelled cassettes that surround the TV like perpetual presents around a Christmas tree. If she wants to watch a recorded program, I cue up the tape and remind her which combination of buttons to press on the eight remote control handsets that seem to inhabit every horizontal surface in our living room. I pride myself that as an electronics engineer with some twenty years practice of using VCRs I can actually program the damn thing. Usually I can disdainfully pass off the frequent incorrect recordings or missed program endings as a being down to a last minute change in the broadcasters schedules. But there has to be a better way, doesn't there?

Yes there is a better way. Two products that came onto the market last year can revolutionise the way you watch TV. Tivo and Sky+ are personal video recorders intended to allow you to see the programs you want to watch when you want to watch them. No tapes to rewind, label or lose - all the recordings are stored inside the box. Setting a program to record is just a matter of selecting the program in the onscreen TV guide and pressing the 'R' button. To playback, select the program name from the onscreen menu and press play. It's so simple that even an adult can do it!

But there's more. The quality of recording is far better than clunky old VHS tape. You can playback a program and record another at the same time. You can start playback before the recording has finished, if you just want to delay the start by a few minutes. You can set a season pass on favourite programs and then all future episodes in the series will be recorded automatically.

However, one of the best features is the ability to pause 'live' TV. Have you ever been engrossed in watching a good program and then the phone rings? Just press the pause button on the handset - the picture onscreen will freeze and the rest of the program will be recorded automatically. When you've finished the phone call, whether it is two minutes or twenty, just press play and you can carry on watching from where you were. No need ever again to ever miss a crucial row in Eastenders because of a caller.

When you have filled up the recording store in the box (about

20 hours) the oldest recordings you have watched will be erased to make room for new ones. If you want to keep a program you can either mark it to be kept, or record it off onto an old fashioned VCR.

There are two types of personal video recorder available. Tivo works with normal TV, digital terrestrial or satellite. Sky+ works just with Sky Digital, but offers a more integrated solution with its built-in satellite receiver and is probably a better bet if you are happy to subscribe to Sky. Sky+ also overcomes the old satellite TV problem of allowing you to record one program whilst watching another, whilst Tivo can even automatically record programs that it thinks you might like

Of course, all this high-tech wizardry comes at a cost. Around £250-300 for the box, possibly an installation fee and a subscription or payment for the program listings all adds up, but the system does work. It does exactly what it says on the box. Its no longer a hassle to time-shift a program and you do end up watching the programs you want when you want to see them.

So have they got it right? Well, watching Mrs Ed set programs for record, then locate and play them back, and listening to her enthusiastically espousing the virtues of our Sky+ system at a dinner party the other night, I am forced to conclude that they have. This is a gadget that anybody can use and it allows you to pick and choose what you want to watch and when you want to watch it. And what's more, it's not just a toy for the boys.



### Police Advice ~ Bogus Traders



programme "Rogue Traders", though this is not dissimilar in some aspects!

Last month's article was about people calling at your door. You may be faced with callers offering to repair or improve your home. Many of these are quite reputable, but some are not what they appear to be. They may claim to have noticed a fault in your roof or walls, or offer to resurface a path or drive. They are skilled conmen and will almost always sound genuine, offering cut-price service usually for cash.

The following advice will help you establish whether such workmen are genuine.

- Ask to see their credentials most genuine traders have a business card.
- Ask them to call again. In the meantime check their reputation. Don't be pressured; if they are genuine, they won't mind waiting a few days.
- Ask for a written quotation not an estimate, which is only a guess at the cost involved.
- Ask if the guarantee is still valid if the company goes into liquidation before it expires. Check on their story and check all agreements. (The local Citizens' Advice Bureau will help you.)

Remember a 'cheap' job may cost you thousands of pounds more in the long run.

Never allow unqualified or uninsured builders or tradesmen to work on your property.

Get other quotations for the work involved from reputable local tradesmen. If in doubt, and the job is large, pay for an independent survey of your property including the fault.

Consult the relevant professional body, who will recommend a suitable contractor. For example consult the Building Employers Confederation (BEC), Federation of Master Builders for building work, the Guild of Master Craftsmen for skilled work such as Joinery and the Electrical Contractors Association (ECA) or the National Inspection Council for Electrical Installation Contracting (NICEIC) foe electrical

Report any suspicious callers to the Police - you may save someone else from being cheated!





### **Rectors Report**

From time to time I get the opportunity to read what my fellow clergy are writing to their parishioners. As you can imagine there are Parish Magazines and Parish Magazines. Some clergy are writing in a Magazine that will only go to Church people, whilst others are writing for a wider audience.

I was recently flicking through a "Church" Magazine, and my eye was caught by an entry on the Diary page. "29<sup>th</sup> Mar. Good Friday – Who is this? The Vicar."

It wasn't until I had read the rest of the Magazine that I discovered that this was not what I had first imagined. Instead it was just a short notice for a Service on Good Friday at which the Vicar was to preach on the subject "Who is this?" — (presumably reflecting on the events leading to the crucifixion of Jesus).

But, by that time I had already started to explore some of the other possible interpretations. These varied from being part of a series based on various occupations – (Who is this? The Doctor, the Butcher, the Plumber, etc.), through to the curious yet commonly held assumption that the Church somehow belongs to the Vicar.

Somewhere along the line I came to imagine the question to be—"Who does he think he is? The Vicar". Of course, the meaning changes again if the question mark is moved to the end—"Who is this, the Vicar?" Or it might even be "Who does the Vicar think he is?"

But however many ways in which the question is examined we end up looking at much the same answer – The question is about who we think we are and how and where we relate to the

community. Perhaps that was what that particular Vicar was going to use as his starting point.

We take time to work out who we are and so on, but do we explore our relationship with Jesus. Looking at who he was and is, and what he has done for us by dying on the Cross and by rising to new life.

The hard part is looking beyond the messenger and concentrating on the message and its implications.




