Countryside Matters

If you had the chance to watch Countryfile last Sunday, you would begin to understand the catastrophic situation with Dairy Farmers. Only 11,000 left, half the number 20 years ago. Two farmers sell their cows everyday, some cows go to other herds, a large proportion to slaughter. Yes that's right, 700 farms a year close down nationwide. The supermarkets screw the last available penny out of you so there is no point in losing money, even if you love the job.

But the situation has more serious side effects. No bull calves enter the beef chain, fewer heifers for replacement stock, less men working the land, less income for the rural community, for village shops, pubs and garages. I know this sounds like a winge, but examine those facts!

The supermarkets, which I know we all use, have decimated the High Street, with some market towns only left with charity shops, book makers and the occasional estate agent. There are some exceptions, Leighton Buzzard still has 2 butchers and a good weekly market. I see Tescos are back to selling imported South American meat, so much for supporting the British meat industry.

Lastly, Arla Foods are about to build the largest milk processing plant in the UK on our doorstep in Aston Clinton. Am I missing something here? But of course foreign milk can be tankered in daily. The puppies have all gone to lovely caring families, some with children. We have weekly action email reports and I see they are giving great joy and happiness already. *James Henderson*

Village Orchard

At a well attended meeting in the Church Room on Tuesday 14th June Peter Knight set out his vision to establish a village orchard on land immediately behind the allotments.


The orchard, to be named the Vic Scott Orchard, will occupy an area of approximately 2.25 acres. It will be possible to accommodate almost 150 trees spaced 20 feet apart. There are approximately 200 households in Aston Abbotts – at the meeting it was agreed that initially each household should be limited to one tree. This policy can be reviewed in subsequent years.

It was emphasised that the orchard will be for every

villager to enjoy at all times of the year and that all villagers will have the opportunity to be involved in the planting and distribution and receipt of fruit and juice pressings.

An order for saplings will be placed in time for an initial planting this autumn. It is proposed that all the varieties of trees chosen will have an association with Aston Abbotts and/or Buckinghamshire. The likely cost of a tree will be £30.

If any villager or household would like to have a tree planted then please contact Peter to discuss the type and variety of tree you would like. Catalogues are available for inspection. It is envisaged that individual trees can have plaques to record the family or individual the tree commemorates. Below is a layout of the orchard.

The central open area can be used during harvest time and at other events. If wished it will be possible to incorporate benches and to plant areas with bulbs and flowers and to leave some grass areas uncut. When the trees are well grown then nest boxes and bat boxes can be incorporated. It is anticipated that the orchard will be productive within five years (some trees sooner).

The response from the village has far exceeded our best hopes. We are confident this will be a great asset for our village and will provide a focus for many social events in the years to come.

If you did not get to the meeting and want to know more about our plans, or would like to donate a tree, then please contact either Peter Knight, John Hardcastle or Gordon Smith or put a note through Peter's door at 59 The Green. We need to know approximately how many trees we should order to ensure supplies, so please state your preference for variety (apple,plum,pear etc).

We only have a few tickets left, they are positioned by the bar unfortunately (or not) so if you would like them please get in touch before they go on Ebay (joke).





July 1955

The Weather

A wonderful month of almost continuous sunshine. Rainfall negligible.

Bird Life

The outstanding feature of the month was the sight of a Buzzard on 27th, in high, soaring flight at approximately mid-day. Weather at the time fine, wind NW. This constitutes my first record of this magnificent bird of prey at Aston Abbotts.

An August Evening (5th August 1945)

The sun sinks below the Western horizon on this perfect summer's evening. The month is August and life in the insect world is at its height. An hour or so ago butterflies of many different kinds were flitting from flower to flower, and thousands of bees were busy in the same manner. Now, however, the butterflies are resting, the bees have returned again to their nests; or hives, as the case may be; and the day-birds are roosting in the green hedgerows.

The time is 9.20pm and dusk is beginning to fall. In the distance a tawny owl is answering the call of its mate in another tree: the creatures of the day are resting, but the creatures of the night are waking.

Only a couple of yards away from me, primrose yellow sweet scented flowers of Oenothera are opening wide, giving forth their mild, but fragrant perfume, as a call to passing moths. On a wide open spray of mauve Buddleia four moths are sipping the nectar, while a Silver Y moth flits round the Oenothera.

For a moment a large moth, probably a Dark Arches, hovers near my hand, before being lost to sight over the garden wall. Dainty Lace-wing Flies and other nocturnal insects fly gently to and fro. A bat, most probably a Pipistrelle, flies around the house and nearby farm buildings, uttering frequently its high-pitched squeak.

The flowers of Marigolds and Eschecholtzias are tightly closed, while the giant Sunflowers hang their heads.

Hundreds of moths are now on the wing, pure white Gold-tails and White Plumes drift like snowflakes on the evening air, while higher up large and powerful species dash to and fro. Now at 9.45pm the sprays of Buddleia are almost covered with moths, varying in size from the diminutive moths of the Tineae group to large Yellow Underwings, Brimstones, Magpies, Dark Arches, Turnip Moths and hundreds of others are on the wing as I retire for the night at 10 o'clock.





ALLOTMENT DIARY

You may recall my mentioning in last month's piece that hardly any of my carrot seeds had germinated, and that I was therefore replanting 3 of the 4 rows of carrots. This involved my making a shallow trench in the rows for the new seed, and then brushing the earth back over it. I have good news and bad news to report: the good news is that the second sewing of seeds has worked, and the carrots have germinated nicely. The bad news is that the original seeds have now decided to germinate as well! I now have large numbers of carrots, growing in profusion alongside each of my planned rows, so that it is now very difficult to walk alongside the rows to weed them. While the carrots in the row which I did not replant (an expensive variety produced by the Duchy of Cornwall) are still refusing to germinate, apart from those that had done so before my last article!

Because of the drought, for the first time ever I have been having to take water down to the allotment, since I have virtually exhausted the supply in the many water butts that I keep there. (However, as I write this article (in mid-June), the weather seems to be changing, and has been almost April-like, with numerous showers).

Nevertheless, I mustn't complain: it is just my hobby that is being buggered up by the strange weather we have had this year. I read that Northern Europe is facing its worst drought for 35 years. River levels on the Danube and the Rhine are so low that cargo boats are having to carry lighter loads to avoid running aground. Nuclear power plants in France may have to be closed because they are running short of cooling water from rivers. Cattle in central France are having to eat the hay intended for the winter, after months of drought has turned the fields yellow.

In general, northern Europe has had 50% of its usual rainfall over the last two months, while temperatures have been 4C higher than normal. Some German regions have had only 5% of the usual rainfall this spring. Here in southern England, corn crops are several inches shorter than they should be at this time of year, and we are told that even if the summer is a wet one, they will never recover this missing growth. It seems inevitable that this autumn will see a dramatic rise in food prices. The UN fears rioting in poor countries, and its officials said the global price of cereals had already risen by 70% over the last 12 months.

I have also read that in China the weather has swung from one extreme to the other with bewildering speed, and tragic results. Large parts of central and southern China had had almost no rain since last October, and the Yangtze River had experienced its worst drought for more than a century. Then at the beginning of June the monsoon arrived. However, as the rain fell on ground baked as hard as concrete, the rainwater triggered severe flooding, with around 40 people being killed, and 60,000 being made homeless.

But enough of global misfortune: back here, there has been a silver lining. Strawberries and summer raspberries are very early, and large. I picked my first strawberries and raspberries on 1st June, which I am sure is the earliest I have ever done so. Richard Clarke has just enjoyed his first new potatoes. And with some judicious watering, all my other crops – and so far as I can tell, those of my fellow allotmenteers - are thriving – even, now, the carrots!

I am just about to leave for some walking in the French Alps: last time I was there a friend who has an allotment in the village next door to where I am staying was bemoaning the fact that a wild boar had just uprooted all her potatoes: I will let you know in the next Chronicle if there is any equally interesting horticultural news to bring you from France..







Chairman's report: In Cllr Shorrock's absence the Clerk referred to the Chairman's report to the Annual Parish meeting where he summarised the work the Council had performed during the year.

Correspondence to note: — The Clerk advised he had received a letter from BCC Policy and Performance regarding the co-ordination of communication channels with residents. It was AGREED that the Clerk would pass future correspondence to Cllr Carvey who would edit and pass to the Editor of the Chronicle or other media forms.

The Clerk passed round a copy of the Weedon Village plan that had just been completed and it would be used for reference to our own draft.

District Councillor P Cooper wished to thank all those who supported him in the recent Elections. He went on to explain that his focus was to work on local issues as well as actively pursue the cooperation between AVDC and BCC particularly in the area of Finance where the combination of administration services may provide the opportunity for savings and more efficient operations. Cllr Cooper recommended the Parish Council explores the opportunity to introduce a Neighbourhood Plan. Finally he felt that we should look to raise a proportion of the funding for the completion of the footpath to the Wingrave crossroads following the recent granting of funding for Phase 2. Although further grants may be available it was likely we would need a fund in support of any application.

Planning

11/00781/APP (12 The Green – Mr B & Mrs C Carvey)

Increase of pitch roof over existing single storey element including two front dormer windows to provide living accommodation on the first floor.

The application was discussed and it was RESOLVED to have no objections to this application.

11/00799/APP (Longmoor Bungalow, Cublington Road - Mr D & Mrs M Gadsby)

Demolition of existing dwelling and erection of new two storey dwelling house and detached garage.

The application was discussed and it was RESOLVED to oppose this application as it was felt the proposed Garage was outside the building line and additionally the style and scale of the proposed dwelling was not consistent with the adjoining cottages, The overall bulk versus these cottages is not in keeping.

Egg Production Plant – The Clerk reported we were still awaiting the retrospective application for this facility and it was agreed the vehicle movement data would be forwarded to AVDC.

Neighbourhood Plan – It was agreed that a meeting between Councillors and AVDC to discuss a way forward be arranged.

Village Plan - The Clerk read out a note from Cllr Perkins on the current status of the Plan. The questionnaire had been reviewed and was being formatted, The consultation would then be completed using various methods. It was noted that there were a number of different drafts created by a number of different people and some areas were not completely up to date. A further more detailed review of the plan was to be undertaken and amendments made. There followed a general discussion around the methods of consultation and Cllr Carvey would contact Cllr Perkins to explore the potential of using the Aston Abbotts website.

Local Area Forum: The Clerk reported he had submitted our application for Phase 3 of the footpath and this would provide an up to date costing for the works to completion. The date of the next LAF meeting was 21st June 2011.

Recreation Ground Safety Check: Cllr Clark reported that the bench had been broken beyond repair and removed and the issue regarding the broken latch on the gate was being attended to.

Astonbury - It was RESOLVED to allow the use of the Recreation Ground to the organisers, this was subject to Cllr Clark obtaining clarity on the following points. Did the event require a Temporary Event Licence, Parking arrangements in particular in relation to access by an emergency vehicle, clean up arrangements and insurance.

Date of next meeting - It was confirmed that the next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 22nd June 2011 at 7:30pm in the Church.

- 3. **Judging** Major Tim Peacocke & Mr Andy ('Carefree') Shillingford have once again 'volunteered' to judge all three categories of the competition. Their decisions will be final!!



MEKNES - memories of Moroccan holiday

The traffic inched along passed scruffy shops and cafes as we sought to leave Fes airport for the ancient imperial city of Meknes in Morocco. The driver had promised an hour but after an hour we had only made it to our first significant milestone. "Supermarket!" announced the driver proudly pointing in the fast fading light to an enormous new hyper market on the edge of Fes. Anything less like my image of that exotic city seemed impossible. We were now moving faster passed many half constructed high rise buildings. At last a sign to Meknes loomed out of the dark only 50km to go. Tail gating alarmingly the driver picked up speed, at about 7.45pm we passed many butcher's shops displaying whole carcasses. A heart stopping moment as we overtook a lorry on a blind bend. I closed my eyes praying to God or Allah or anyone else that might be up there, opened my eyes and realised, with relief, we were on a small stretch of dual carriageway.

As we circled the walls of the ancient city of Meknes the driver offers to take us out tomorrow to the Roman ruins of Volubilis, we decline. Finally we stop outside an arch in the wall. We are on foot from now on. A short walk to the best hotel in town the Palace Didi- it looked lovely in the brochure. Part of the now derelict Imperial palace of Sultan Moulay Ismail (1672-1727), the Riad (building with central courtyard) Palace Didi was once the quarters of the Sultan's favourite wives. We are shown to our quarters my senses are assaulted by red. The four poster bed is surrounded by deep red velvet drapes with glass beads, the bed top covered with chiffon embroidered with large red flowers and with deep red and gold bed covers. Huge, intricately worked, metal lanterns hang from the ceiling which is lined with beige material apart from the sheepskin circle around the light fitting. Despite their size the lanterns make little impression so the atmosphere is somewhat gloomy. The windows consist of yellow, blue and orange panes of glass. The huge olive wood doors are elaborately painted in golds, reds and greens. Having flown by Ryanair we are a bit peckish so enquire as to the chances of dinner at 8.45pm. Yes dinner is available in the upstairs restaurant where we discover 4 wise French tourists sitting in the corner away from the blazing fire. We are handed laminated menus, it does not look promising. I choose the set menu of traditional bean soup (harira). vegetarian tagine and oranges. The soup is hearty and hot, the tagine is a mixture of very minty peas. carrot and potato. Nigel has picked chicken tagine with olives. When the waiter lifts the lid a huge pile of olives is revealed but after some judicious prodding chicken is discovered at the bottom. As usual the Moroccan oranges sprinkled with cinnamon are delicious.

I awake next morning. Coloured light is slanting through the windows. Out of bed on the ancient tiled floor the room is chilly. I try to imagine what life must have been like for the Sultan's wives living in such a place day in day out- not great I guess. Breakfast is laid on a table outside our room it is a distinct improvement on dinner and very French in nature reflecting the legacy left by that country on modern Morocco. However in a nod to Moroccan cuisine it includes cumin flavoured egg brought sizzling in a tagine to be eaten immediately as scrambled egg or left to become an omelette.

Fortified by breakfast we set out for a day's sightseeing. First stop is the Mausoleum of Sultan Moulay Ismail. Beautifully decorated with Zilij tiling, carved cedar wood and stucco plaster the tomb itself is bizarrely surrounded by 4 distinctly European grandfather clocks. Apparently the Sultan's ideas of grandeur extended to an attempt to add the daughter to the Sun King Louis XIV of France (who built the Palace of Versaille) to his harem. The Sultan's ambassador was swiftly sent packing with the clocks as consolation. We take a horse drawn carriage ride to the granaries constructed to biblical proportions by the Sultan to store grain, presumably in readiness for a famine, and the pleasure /water storage lake he had constructed in front of them. After an interesting day that included a visit to the local market and trip to a carpet shop (a story in itself) we end the day at an almost deserted but lovely local restaurant overlooking the medina and enjoy delicious trout from the rivers of the Atlas mountains and a Moroccan dessert called briouats (sweet filled filo pastry envelopes).

In 90% of cases because the signal strength will increase most aerials will not need changing, but if you don't currently own a digital TV then a digibox will be needed. 'Love Your Land Rover' Crime Prevention Campaign - The Aylesbury Vale Community Safety Partnership (AVCSP) has developed an initiative to help reduce the theft of Land Rover vehicles across the Vale. In the last twelve months there has been a significant increase in Land Rovers thefts - particularly older Defender models. The majority of thefts have taken place in rural areas with many on farm premises. The Defender model is particularly attractive to thieves as they can be easily dismantled to provide for spare parts and there is a market for the vehicles in Eastern Europe. 



CHURCH CLOCK

Some time during the winter, the church clock stopped working. Not an unusual occurrence but as it was so damn cold, I had no intention of going up the tower to repair it, so it remained stopped for several months! By mid March it had warmed up a little so Colin and I had a couple of goes at fixing it but it defied all our usual ploys of cleaning the works, trying to see if anything was 'stuck' and liberally spraying WD 40 about. On about the third visit, I traced the problem to one of the 'gearboxes' which transmit the motion of the clock to the hands outside the tower. The offending gearbox was situated out of sight, behind the mechanism and probably hadn't seen oil since it was installed in by Gillett & Co. back in 1889.

Clearly it had to be removed, requiring me to crawl 'snakelike' (not entirely suited to my waistline!) through the mechanism and into the very small place behind the clock; thick with grease, the dust of ages and spiders the size of dinner plates!! Ok, perhaps not quite that big! Anyway, eventually it was removed and taken back to my workshop where I found it to be seized solid with rust and dirt.


Having repaired it, more 'snakelike' manoeuvering through the mechanism and it was re-bolted to the wall and coupled up to it's shafts.

Job done!! The clock worked perfectly and kept good

time until the beginning of May then unexpectedly stopped again. This time, the reason was painfully obvious; the pendulum had broken at it's attachment point and in falling, damaged other parts of the mechanism.

At the time of writing the pendulum (less it's 'bob which weighs about 100 lbs) is back in my workshop. Its been stripped down to its 38 separate parts which will cleaned and reassembled after I've sourced the broken suspension leaf spring.....





The church tower is home to a chiming clock made by Gillett and Co in 1889 and six bells. The clock was fitted with an electric winding mechanism some years ago and it was re-faced in 1991. Three of the bells were cast by blacksmiths the Chandlers of Drayton Parslow in 1652 and bear the inscription "Chandler made me". One of these had to be recast in 1929. Two other bells were made in 1739 and 1740 and are inscribed, "Edward Hall made me". The final bell is more modern and was a gift in 1929 from an American, William Putnam, in memory of his ancestor who left Aston Abbotts for the New World about 1630.

The suffix 'Abbotts' refers to the ancient abbey in the village, which until the Dissolution of the Monasteries was the country home of the abbots of St Albans in Hertfordshire. The present house known as The Abbey, Aston Abbotts was largely rebuilt in the early 19th century.






