

Sketch by Elizabeth Ogan in Elizabeth Cull's 'A Picture of Buckinghamshire'.




The octagonal dovecote at Manor Farm, Stewkley, is dated 1704. It had nesting space for eight-hundred birds.



#### ASTON ABBOTTS

The Bishop Confirms. — The Bishop of Buckingham, the Rt. Rev. R. M. Hay, officiated at a Confirmation service at St. James' Church on Sunday. He was assisted by the Rev. C. W. Morris (vicar) and the Rev. C. N. Beasley (rector of Hoggeston with Dunton), who acted as Bishop's chaplain. The candidates were four Indies from Hoggeston and five local youths. The Bishop also gave an address. Mrs. D. Scutchings was organist.

Death of Mrs. S. A. Simmonds .-Mrs. Sarah Ann Simmonds, 17, Aston Abbotts, was found dead by her daughter, Mrs. G. Kent, on Saturday evening. Only an hour before. Mrs., Simmonds had been out in her garden. Born at Aston Abbotts 76 years ago. She lived in London and then Reading after her marriage, but returned to Aston Abbotts many years ago. Mrs. Simmonds, a staunch chapel-lady, is survived by two married daugh-Her husband pre-deceased her 34 years ago. The funeral took place yesterday (Thursday) Abbotts Methodist Aston church, the Rev. W. Dolling, of Aylesbury, conducting the service. Mr. F. H. Sheffield, Great Western Street, Aylesbury, carried out the funeral arrangements.

#### ASTON ABBOTTS

Cricket Club. — Mr. F. Humphreys was re-elected captain at the annual meeting of the Cricket Club in the Church Room on Monday. Other elections were: The Rev. C. W. Morris, chairman; Mr. T. Humphreys, treasurer; Messrs. A. and S. Bennion, joint secretaries; Mr. F. Higgs, vice-captain; and Messrs. G. Bennion and W. Brazier, umpires. Mr. V. Scott was appointed groundsman. Playing record for last season was won 8, lost 6, drawn 2. F. Higgs and A. Bennion headed the batting and bowling averages, respectively.

Young Conservative Branch Formed. — A Young Cinservative incorporate to Aston Abbotts, Wingrave and Cublington, was formed at the annual meeting of the Aston Abbotts and Cublington Conservative Association in the Schoolroom on Tuesday. Officers elected were: Chairman, Mr. C. Morton: vice-chairman, Miss D. Ford; hon, secretary, Mr. M. Page; and hon, treasurer, Mr. A. Read. Major H. T. Morton, chairman of the local association, presided over a well attended meeting, and it was stated that the Association had a balance in hand of £16 10s. 11d., £70 having been donated to the Central Fund. The Secretary, Mrs. L. Brock, said that she hoped that in the near future the century-mark would be reached in membership. There are at present 97 members, compared with 88 last year. The Chairman gave a short report on the four-day conference at Llandudno. Mr. M. B. Bladen, Agent for the North Bucks Conservative Association, some arresting figures about North Bucks area (Aston Abbotts and Cublington have recently been transferred from Mid to North Bucks) and said that in 1945 there were only five brandhes of the Conservative Association. At the present time there are 61 branches, in an area comprising nearly 1.000 square miles. Mr. John Hayman, hon, secretary of Aylesbury Young Conservatives, also gave a short address. Officers re-elected were: Chairman, Major H. T. Morton; vice-chairman, Mr. A. Biggs; hon. secretary, Mrs. L. Brock; and hon. treasurer, Mr. H. How. Members elected to serve on the committee were: Mesdames H. T. Morton, W. S. Steel, G. Sharp, S. Porter and L. How, Messrs. A. Biggs, C. Sparkes, W. S. Steel, G, Sharp and L. Cowley, Dr. Brown and Miss. J. Cowley, Dr. Brown and Miss Childerley. Mr. W. S. Steel and Mrs. H. T. Morton were re-elected to serve as delegates to the Divisional Executive meetings.


# A rolling English road with just a whisper of Betjeman country

#### WEEKEND WALK

First, the bad news. If you do this walk by train, so to speak, you will have to retrace twomiles-worth of your footsteps at the end of the journey to get back to Tring.

No matter, there are plenty of consolations. Here is a bouncy, breezy hike along the Icknield Way, which has been trodden on by millions of people and animals since palaeolithic times. It was part of a vital chalk grid of pedestrian motorways, running all the way from south Dorset to Norwich and the Wash.

Part of the joy of this walk, if you are coming from London, is the train ride through Metroland to Wendever station, which is but a Betjeman's whisper from the route. Stroll through the town, then south and east into open



country and on to the long contours of Cock's Hill. Chivery, Hastoe and Wiggington Bottom - the names pass rhythmically by between the broken, rutted route of Grim's Ditch to the right and its modern counterpart, the A41(M), mercifully distant on the left.

Wander on, across the course of an old Roman road, since hijacked by the motor car, then over the bridge straddling the Grand Union Canal, to the railway line and

the north. A compact, friendly switchback of hills takes you finally across a small protrusion of Hertfordshire, on to the fine vantage point of Ivinghoe Beacon and then, alas, back again.





Parker found the net for a face saving equaliser.



Your Rights of Way are:

Public footpaths – on foot only

Bridleways – on foot,horseback and pedal cycle

By-ways – open to all traffic but do not expect a smooth surface.

'Roads used as Public Paths' – the traffic entitled to use these depends on the legal history of the path and will probably be at least the same as the traffic entitled to use a bridleway.

The nature of the use you can make of rights of way is important. You may only take a bona fide journey with reasonable rest along the way.

#### On Rights of Way you can:

take a pram, pushchair, wheelchair, but expect to encounter stiles on footpaths



take a dog, preferably on a lead or in any case under close control

take a short alternative route around an illegal obstacle


remove an illegal obstacle sufficiently to get past.

There is an ancient Common Law right to pass and repass along the highways at all times. Footpaths and bridleways are highways. They only differ from other forms of highway, such as roads, by the type of traffic entitled to use them.

Lack of use has no effect on the legal existence of a right of way.

Widths of Rights of Way – The Definitive Map kept by the County Council sometimes specifies the width of a path, but where this is not so the assumption is that a footpath without boundaries crossing open ground or fields should have a width sufficient for two walkers to pass in comfort. A bridleway without

boundaries should allow a horse to overtake and pass another horse safely On roads used as public paths or 'byways' the width is normally accepted as whatever exists on the ground.



Ordnance Survey Pathfinder and Landranger maps show most public rights of way but there may have been changes since the map was published. The Definitive Map is the most reliable guide.

You must leave land to which you have no legal right of access if asked to do so by the owner or his representative.

#### The County Council is responsible for:

The accurate and continuous recording of public rights of way on the DEFINITIVE MAP. This map



may be inspected at County Hall or at District Council Offices. Copies are supplied to Parish Councils.

Signposting of footpaths and bridleways and necessary way-marking.

Maintaining, and controlling natural vegetation on the surface of footpaths and bridleways. In practice, few field paths receive routine maintenance, and walkers should be prepared to use boots or wellingtons in poor weather.



Maintaining bridges over natural water courses.

Making grants to farmers or landowners of at least a quarter of the cost of maintaining approved stiles and bridlegates.

Administering the law concerning rights of way, and in particular ensuring that they can be used by the public.

#### Farmers should:

know where public rights of way cross their land and maintain stiles and bridlegates in good order.

refrain from obstructing the paths, and cut back overhanging vegetation (growing crops are obstructions).



refrain from ploughing a footpath or bridleway which constitutes a headland of a field, or runs alongside a hedgerow.

ensure that paths across fields are reinstated two weeks after ploughing. Disturbance to paths following drainage schemes should be remedied without delay.

not allow any dairy bull over ten months of age free range of any field through which a path or bridleway passes.

To be legal, bulls of other breeds must be accompained by cows or heifers.

obtain the consent of the County Council before erecting new stiles or gates.

provide adequate bridges where new ditches are made or existing ones widened.

It is illegal to put plain, barbed, or electrified wire across a right of way. It is not illegal to run wire along the side of a right of way unless it is dangerous or inconvenient to a person using the way.

By-ways and "Roads used as Public Paths" may not be ploughed under any circumstances.

Landowners and farmers may shoot on their land but not in such a way as to endanger the public using a right of way.

Remember that by using the paths properly and within your rights you are much less likely to come across problems than if you abuse them.



#### Follow the Country Code:

Enjoy the countryside and respect its life and work.

Guard against all risk of fire.

Fasten all gates.

Keep your dogs under close control.

Keep to public paths across farmland.

Use gates and stiles to cross fences, hedges, and walls.

Leave livestock, crops and machinery alone.

Take your litter home.

Help to keep all water clean.

Protect wildlife, plants and trees.

Take special care on country roads.

Make no unnecessary noise.

Apart from this, there are two ways in particular by which you can help to promote harmony in the countryside.

If you drive out before starting your walk, do not park your car where it can obstruct access to fields.

If you are in a party, walk or ride in single file, and do not trespass by spreading out beyond the confines of the path.



These local councils, and Parish Meetings too, have a central and crucial role to play in safeguarding the network of ancient rights of way which covers the whole of our countryside and our settlements. No other authority can know the local paths as well as a local council can.

Ways in which a local council can look after its public rights of way:

Form a Rights of Way Committee and co-opt farmers

and other interested local people to gain the benefit of their knowledge and experience.

Carry out regular inspections (at least twice a year) of all the rights of way in the parish or community, noting any matters which need attention, and following these up as appropriate.



Try to resolve problems such as ploughing and obstruction with the person responsible. If this approach is not successful, report the matter to the County Council and see that it takes action.

Check that all stiles and gates on public rights of way are easy for all members of the public to use, and draw attention of the occupiers to any difficulties.



In agreement with the County Council and landowners, ensure that rights of way are waymarked along their length, either by carrying out the work or by asking for the assistance of the County Council.

Display a map showing the local rights of way in one or more places in the parish or community.


Publish a guidebook to local walks. The County Council may be able to help in this.

Organise walks for the public. This both encourages the public to use the paths, and provides an opportunity for the council to show to the public the work it has done on their behalf.
