

AN ENGLISH KNIGHT? SAINT GEORGE (& THE DRAGON)

We know very little for sure about St George - but he probably lived in the Middle East in the 3rd century, a soldier killed by the Romans in Palestine for his Christian faith. The famous story about the dragon grew many years later: how a dragon terrorizing a whole country was killed by St George as it was about to devour the king's daughter, and 15,000 people were baptized into the Christian faith as a result of George's intervention. The saint was most popular during the mediaeval age of chivalry. He became the patron saint not only of England, but also of Venice, Genoa, Portugal and Catalonia. His feast day is 23rd April. RECTOR' REPORT

The last month has seen the usual spate of Annual Meetings. There are two schools of thought about these.

One school says that they are a necessary evil. We have to have them, and if there are only a very few people present that could be a good thing. But when this happens, we always feel cheated. We expect more people to come and show an interest in what is going on - and, hopefully, agree to offer their help for the coming year.

The other viewpoint is that these meetings are so important that lots of people will want to come and have their say.

Interestingly the Church does not seem to give a minimum number for attendance at the Annual Church Meeting.
But then the Church Annual Meeting is usually three meetings rolled into one.

The first part, which is open to all those who are resident in the parish is the Annual Vestry. This is a very ancient meeting, going back to the time when the Church was the focus of local government. This meeting elects the two Churchwardens for the coming year.

The second meeting is for those who are on the Church Electoral Roll.It reviews the life of the Parish Church over the last twelve months, including its finances (which these days seem to be very important). It also elects the Parochial Church Council for the coming year and appoints the sidesmen and the auditor.

The third part of the meeting is ameeting of the newly elected P.C.C. to elect their Secretary and Treasurer, to deal with any urgent business and to fix the date of their next meeting.

It all sounds deadly dull(and I have to confess - it sometimes is). Too often we get bogged down with our domestic problems. Too often we lose sight of our purpose which is the effective sharing of the Good News of Jesus with the people among whom we live.

Traditionally the Annual Meetings in the Church of England have been associated with Easter, when we celebrate the new life of the Risen Christ. Whether or not our particular parish has had a good or a bad year, we always need to see it in relation to the Cross and Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

No matter how many or how few people come, the Annual

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

held at The Church Room, Aston Abbotts on Monday 7 March 1994, 7.30 p.m.

***PLEASE NOTE THAT THESE ARE DRAFT MINUTES, AND LET GORDON SMITH KNOW IF THERE ARE ANY INACCURACIES

PRESENT Chairman of the Parish Council (Caroline Lane), Clerk to the Annual Parish Meeting (Gordon Smith), 11 members of the Parish and PC Griggs. Apologies received from Jean Barnett, The Rev. Bob Willmott, Brenda Jennings and Bryan Round.

MINUTE 1 The minutes of the previous meeting were read, accepted by the Meeting, and signed by the Chairman.

MINUTE 2 Matters arising

A418 Caroline Lane reported that the Government had withdrawn previously proposed plans for the A418, and that a Government announcement on the subject was expected in late March; that the Government Inspector had given his view that in relation to the Wing bypass only the Northern or 'Rothschild' route was worthy of further investigation; that the Parish Council would keep chasing for further information.

MINUTE 3 Neighbourhood Watch

On behalf of Jean Barnett, Caroline Lane announced that the NW scheme was revitalized, and that there had been a good response to the request for local coordinators. At present, coordinators were as follows: Jean Barnett, Janet Biddle, John Brancker, Roy Malin, Les Smith, Chris Fox, Rosemary Franklin, Chris Brandon. Two further coordinators were required, and residents in the relevant areas would have their arms twisted.

MINUTE 4 Police

PC Griggs reported that he was in imminent danger of becoming a father. He further reported on recent crime in the area. There had been a small outbreak of crime in the village, principally affecting cars. Villagers concerns about this had been discussed with members of the Parish Council. Four cars had been tampered with, two had been stolen, and cars from outside the village had been dumped locally. One arrest had been made following the theft of a car in the village. Most incidents had taken place between 3 and 4 a.m.. He said that there had been isolated examples of poaching or 'lamping', but that these had been nearer to Wing than Aston Abbotts. Of the 16 villages that he covered Aston Abbotts and Cublington were still the quietest. He acknowledged concern about speeding through the village, and said that some cars had been stopped: no charges had yet been brought. He hoped that the iminent move of the police station to Wing would enable him to be more visible in Aston Abbotts.

He urged that villagers should <u>always</u> ask for identification of anyone presenting themselves as antique dealers, and should always check the <u>bona fides</u> of such callers by ringing their offices. He also urged that <u>all</u> criminal incidents should be reported to the police to enable a full picture of crime in

the area to be constructed.

MINUTE 5 Village Festival 1993
Gordon Smith reported that total net proceeds had been £930.58, and this had been distributed as agreed at the 1993
APM - i.e. St James's Church 30%, Church Room 20%, Methodist Church 20%, Recreation Ground 15%, Chronicle 10%, Toddlers 5%.

MINUTE 6 <u>Village Festival 1994</u>
The dates for the the 1994 Festival would be Saturday 23 July (Fete) and Sunday 24 July (Church Patronal Festival).

The following had agreed to serve on the Fete Committee: Janet Biddle, Chris Fox, Gordon Smith, David Watts. Although a number of others had offered their services for the day itself, further Committee members were urgently required. [At the time of preparing these minutes Hilary and Michael Hasler have also volunteered for the Committee, which has held its first meeting. More volunteers would be very welcome.]

It was agreed that the distribution of proceeds would be as for 1993.

MINUTE 6 Church Room Management Committee
Colin Higgs reported that one coin meter had been replaced,
but that at the time of the Meeting the new meter was out of
order. He further said that a Committee meeting would be
called when estimates for renewal of guttering and external
decor were to hand.

In response to requests from villagers estimates had been sought for improving toilet facilities. Because any new building would have to meet stringent hygiene and safety standards the estimates had proved to be very high - in the region of £15,000-£22,000 - and that therefore plans had not been taken forward. The Chairman urged that these discussions be publicized to enable wider discussion.

For the record, membership of the Committee continued to be Ruth Bellingham, Barbara Bellingham, Chris Brandon, Margaret Chesher, Colin Higgs, John Ford, John Whyte, Doris Scutchings and the Rev Willmott.

Recreation Ground MINUTE 7 It was reported that new swings had been installed, and that new hedging had been put in place and much clearance work done. Those who had contributed were thanked. Infuriatingly, immediately following the latest clearance work more garden refuse had been dumped at the Rec. A successful fundraising walk had been held in the autumn. Estimates for new safety surfacing were being sought. The Chairman explained that the Recreation Ground Committee was a Subcommittee of the Parish Council, consisting of 3 councillors - Vic Scott, Roger Biddle and John Ford - plus, representing the village, Bridget Brandon, Chris Brandon, John Whyte, Lawrence Hinds and Margaret Kent. More volunteers to help with the work of maintaining and improving the Recreation Ground would be very welcome.

MINUTE 8 The Chronicle
John Whyte (Treasurer) had submitted outline accounts to be
presented in his absence. For the first time in some years
'The Chronicle' was running slightly low on funds as a private
'sponsorship' had run its course. The balance stood at
£189.37, compared with £447.88 a year previously. However, the
forthcoming Cabaret evening, advertising revenue, and the
contribution from the Fete should enable the Chronicle to
continue for a further 12 months.

MINUTE 9 AOB

A question was raised about the maintenance of the seat on the Green. The Chairman said that this had been attended to the previous weekend and that the seat would be looked after.

A question was raised about loose kerbs around the Green. The Chairman said that some work had been done by Bucks C.C., but that she would check if further work needed to be done. The meeting closed at 8.13 p.m.





Unofficial notes from the meeting held on 4th March.

Matters arising

Street lights: the new light by the shop is throwing too much light back onto residential property and the installation company is to be asked to recommend a solution.

Local government reorganization: the parish council felt that the present system of Bucks County Council and Aylesbury Vale District Council worked well and would therefore recommend to the Local Gvt Commission that both be retained, but that Milton Keynes should become a separate authority.

PC Griggs and Sergeant Owens had come to see councillors in response to the parish council's concern about low policing levels in the village. There is little they can do without more resources and therefore welcomed the council's letter of concern to our MP. (See annual parish meeting notes for further details.)

The Lines Hill Gate had been replaced and a letter of thanks was to be sent to Mr & Mrs Von Simson.

Planning applications

The poplar tree at Windmill Hill barns, lopped recently: there had been some doubt about whether the tree was part of the conservation area; the owner of the tree explained to the parish council that it had been lopped because it was dangerous.

Land at Oxley's Farm: the parish council had had a special meeting and supported the landowners' appeal against an enforcement notice.

Bridge Farm (near Rowsham): agricultural worker's dwelling refused by AVDC

Maplewood, The Green: garage extension allowed on appeal

Accounts £336 for new lights; £23.99 repair of light; electricity £39.40; Clerk's salary/expenses £376.65; £133.60 repair of bus shelter roof; Bucks Association of Local Councils £37.31; Parochial Church Council £50 (annual grant); Church Room rental, £25 (annual).

AOB It was decided to enter the Bucks Best Kept Village competition at a cost of £5. The seat on the Green had been rubbed down and oiled. Residents of Ross Road had requested an extra street light and a quote would be sought. BCC would be asked to repair the footway near the Hole in the Road (i.e. junction of Ross Road/Green) and replace the drain.

Cllr Scott and Dean Wiggett had spent much time working to clear the Rec of debris in preparation for the mowing season and were dismayed to find that garden clippings had been dumped there again. It was noted that some of the local footpaths were spoiled by litter. The parish council felt that it was probably people outside the village, not local residents, but agreed that a notice should be put in the Chronicle all the same.


