

RECREATION GROUND IMPROVEMENT

12 people attended the meeting held in the Church Room on Wednesday the 14th of January 98. It was an informal meeting to discuss what could be done by way of improving the existing facilities at the recreation ground within the limitation of available funding and establish what should be done to meet future needs.

Based on requests from some of the youngsters in the village and local residents who were concerned that Brickstock is often used as a play area and quite young children are seen riding recklessly on the roads, the 'Recreation ground Committee had sought quotes for a 'tarmaced' area to be provided within the recreation ground. It was hoped that such an area would facilitate safer cycling for the smaller children and encourage various sporting activities to be played within the 'rec.' when the grass was too wet to be played on. Estimates received varied between £16,964 to £22,600 for a basic surface with all sporting equipment such as basket ball nets being offered as optional extras. Since the Recreation Ground Committee's funds currently stand at approx. £2,000 it was felt that even with the potential to receive '50%' grants, a very large fund raising exercise would be necessary to raise the additional money needed for such a project.

The meeting concluded that as there is such a large disparity between the cost of likely improvements and the cash available, and since no youngsters and very few of the parents affected were present, it is important that an opportunity is created to obtain their (the user's) views. To this end, a meeting will be held at The Recreation Ground on Saturday the 14th Feb. commencing at 12.00 noon. It is hoped that parents, youngsters, and anyone with an interest in the future of the 'rec.' will attend. If you can't be there, please pass your ideas to; - *Tom Manning Tel:- 682115*

The meeting was reminded that further expenditure would be necessary in the short term because of the various reported safety hazards noted during formal annual 'inspections' of the children's play area. The main issues were that the climbing frame had become insecure and is too near to the swings, the slide has a 'finger trap' which needs to be removed and safety surfacing needs to be provided under all equipment. In addition, the slide and climbing frame need painting and all items will have to be modified to allow for the depth of the safety surface material. The meeting felt that since some of these safety matters have been outstanding for two or more years, work must begin early this year. A quotation of £15,000 had been received for the total refurbishment and 'up-dating' of this part of the 'rec.'. However, in the light of the limited cash available some work could be carried out on a DIY basis and hopefully parents of the children who use the equipment would volunteer. Priority would be given to

- a.) Filling in the 'finger trap'.
- b.) Moving the climbing frame and setting it in concrete blocks in such a way that a safety surface can be installed underneath. Linda Sutton offered to obtain quotations and advice in readiness for the instalation of the safety surfaces.

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RECTOR'S REPORT - JANUARY 1998

The early days of January are often occupied in part by my annual jigsaw. I try not to do more than one per year because I find them rather addictive and I don't do very much else until I finish!

This year's jigsaw was, like most jigsaws, of rectangular shape, but, unusually, it was a long thin one that required a different board from the one I normally use.

which explains its long, thin shape). The edge was completed fairly easily, then came the hard part of sorting out the small individual panels. This was complicated by the fact that the ones at the top were upside down to look at, which meant constantly turning the picture round to see what they were meant to be. Normally this would not have proved too much of a problem, but since the manufacturers had kindly supplied a stand to hold the picture (which seemed a very kind and useful addition), I was constantly having to check that the picture was the right way round on the stand.

There were, as in all good jigsaws, the pieces which seemed to belong to an entirely different puzzle until very nearly the end of construction, and pieces which seemed to fit in more than one place. However, the final result was very pleasing - and it was not until, after having left it up for a week or so, I decided that it was time to pack it away, that I discovered on the bottom of the box a description of the various panels and scenes that were displayed.

Several people I saw over the Christmas/New Year period were also engaged on jigsaws, but many of them were trying to complete three-dimensional jigsaws, which are a totally different ball game. A 1000 piece, two-dimensional one is about my limit. I have been known to complete a 2000 piece one, but it seemed to take for ever (and I felt guilty about the time it was taking).

right sequence in order to complete the picture. In many ways our lives are like jigsaw puzzles. We are constantly puzzling over the pieces that are before us and trying to build that into a satisfying life. At times we come across sections of the puzzle that are not too taxing, whilst at other times we feel as though there are too many pieces to fit in and some of them do not seem to belong to the same picture that we think we are creating. We juggle with the events and circumstances of our lives, trying to discover the picture that will eventually reveal itself in all its beauty.

With a jigsaw we are usually helped by having a picture from which to work, but in real life we have to discover the picture (which is already there) revealing itself as we go along.

PANCAKE PARCELS

With Shrove Tuesday only a short while away and having a great love of pancakes, I asked Anne Brancker to recommend a recipe for pancakes which would be a little more exotic that the usual plain ones with lemon and sugar (as nice as they are). She consulted her library (literally) of cookery books and came up with the following. Having tried it out, we can recommend that you do not leave out the brandy!.;-

PANCAKE MIX

4oz plain flour 1 egg 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 pint milk oil for frying

FILING

3 Ripe Bananas Juice of 1 lemon 2 tablespoons apricot jam

SAUCE


1/4 pint orange juice2 tablespoons soft brown sugar1oz butter1/2 teaspoons ground cinnamon2 tablespoons brandy (optional)

To make the batter, sift the flour and salt into a bowl and make a well in the centre. Add the egg, then gradually beat in the milk, drawing in the flour from the sides to make a smooth batter.

Heat a little oil in a frying pan until very hot. Pour in a few spoonfuls of batter, tilting the pan so that it spreads evenly, and cook over high heat until golden brown. Remove from the pan and keep hot while frying the remaining batter, making 8 pancakes in all.

To make the filling, peel the bananas, then mash the flesh with the lemon juice and jam. Divide the filling equally between the pancakes, then fold each pancake around the filling to make a parcel.

To make the sauce, pour the orange juice into a large frying pan. Add the remaining ingredients and bring to the boil, stirring constantly. Boil for 5 minutes until reduced, then lower the heat. Arrange the pancake parcels in a single layer in the pan, then heat through for about 10 minutes, spooning the sauce over the pancakes from time to time. Serve hot, with cream.



WALTINGTON - CHINNOR - PRINCES RISBOROUGH RAILWAY (A HISTORY)


An act of Parliament passed on the 26th July 1869 authorised the Watlington Princes Risborough Railway Co. to construct a light railway (single track) from the GW station at Risborough to Watlington a distance of 8 miles and 66 chains, and largely promoted by local landowners following the failure of plans to extend the Wallington branch to Watlington.

The line opened on the 15th August 1872 and had stations at Chinnor and Aston Rowant and halts at Bledlow, Wainhill and Lewknor, but had financial problems and finally the GW purchased the line in 1883 for æ23000. During inter war years the branch soldered on but World War 11 saw an up-turn in its fortunes and this was maintained when immediately after the war a mail order company started to use it to dispatch goods, but sadly this was short lived, and passenger usage started to decline.

The inevitable result was after a public enquiry British Rail closed the line to passengers in 1957. The last train left Watlington at 9pm (10 mins late) and with a number of dignitaries present, and as had become the custom the train left to the sound of detonators exploding on its last journey after 85 years of history of a passenger branch line. Today the Chinnor -Princes Risborough Railway Association have re-opened the line between Princes Risborough - Bledlow - Wainhill halts to Chinnor, and hopefully extend back to Watlington in the future, and there is even talk of building a M40 interchange at Aston Rowant with trains continuing to Marylebone, good news for a great local line.

Phil Turner from the Parish Paths Partnership Scheme gave a talk on the services provided by the scheme.



VILLAGE HALL DEVELOPMENT

A meeting held on the 29th March 96, concluded the 'millennium' could provide a

focus for fund-raising to improve our 'village hall'. Broad agreement was achieved on the following,-

- 1. Since the deeds are currently held by the Church; before further significant effort or expenditure is committed, a 'trust', or similar, needs to be set up to ensure executive decision making is firmly and legally in the hands of villagers.
- 2. Improved heating, plus male/female toilets meeting modern standards of hygiene should be a priority.
- 3. Storage area for tables, chairs and play-group equipment.
- 4. Kitchen refurbished to meet modern standards of hygiene.
- 5. Access to meet fire regulations and disabled requirements
- 6. Lobby/entrance' area to facilitate coats, double as small meeting room and facilitate Christmas show stage access.
- 7. Exterior sympathetic to existing attractive village hall.

Mrs Caroline Murray generously offered to donate some adjacent land should it be required.

Actions were assigned to; - resolve the issue of 'title' to the hall, identify methods of raising funding, & grants likely to be available, submit a draft plan to AVDC, and design a logo for use with subsequent correspondence. It was felt a further meeting should be called when it is felt significant progress has been made regarding these initial activities. The agenda was expected to include; - Formation of a constituted committee. Identify 'officers' and their terms of reference. Agree layout of hall to be pursued. Agree an initial, phased plan of actions with time scales Record progress of actions in hand. . AOB

Arising from the initial meeting the Vicar has recently established that the church authorities would now be prepared to lease the hall back to the village. A draft design was submitted to Aylesbury Vale Planning Office shortly after the meeting and this coupled with other discussions and a site meeting indicates they will not permit an extension large enough to meet all the objectives stated above since the associated building (though in the same materials and style to the original) would be 'dominant' to the existing. A further problem is that the 'Roads Dept.' would expect 'additional' parking to be provided.

In view of these developments, Councillor Manning has arranged for a further meeting to be held in the church room to identify whether 'the village' wishes to pursue improvements to the hall under the constraints detailed above and if so; agree a specification, actions and responsibilities for achieving it.





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
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
