

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
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IN THE VILLAGE 1.

Shocking increase in cost of bus passes

Many people will have read in the Link, delivered through their doors, that the OAP concessionary bus passes are now available at various offices, ie Aylesbury, Buckingham, Winslow and in many villages, and presumably at the same price as previous years (£10), because nowhere does it state there is an increase.

Imagine the shock of hundreds of people across the

Vale, when they go to collect their pass not at £10 but £25, a massive increase.

I am chairman of the Aylesbury Vale Transport Users Group (AVTUG) and at last Tuesday's meeting had received no consultation on the increase, so perhaps we could receive an explanation.

Many OAPs will be unable to afford such a large increase (their pension increase will be 75p) so therefore will not use the buses which are a lifeline to many living in outlying villages such as Ivinghoe Aston, Ashendon, Wotton etc which means patronage of rural services will drop and the withdrawal of a vital service, seriously affecting rural life, which may also have a knock-on effect on Bucks County Council's Public Transport Strategy to actually improve rural transport, to encourage more people out of

cars and onto buses.

It could also mean job losses (those officers maybe that voted for the increase (so let's hope they feel some guilt in inflicting such an increase on so many people and, in some cases, depriving them of their only weekly link to meet family, friends, or shop outside their own communities.

C HIGGS Wingrave Road Aston Abbotts

Colin Higgs' letter, above, appeared in the Bucks Herald on the 15th March. I guess there really is no more to add to Colin's, and doubtless the majority of villagers', concerns. The Herald carried details of Bucks CC's reasons for such a huge increase - THE CHRONICLE won't. Ed.

Postscript: We can now report that the committee responsible for the decision to increase the charge has decided to limit the rise to £2, giving anew cost of £12 which seems a much more appropriate rate, even though it still represents a 20% uplift. Ed.

AND SOME GOOD NEWS ... FROM AYLESBURY SHOPMOBILITY

With the imminent introduction of the Traffic management bollard system in Aylesbury Town centre only those people who receive the higher rate of disability living allowance will be able to park in the High Street and all the other areas where bollards are being introduced. These actions only reinforce traffic orders, which have been in operation for a long time but are systematically abused. Orange badge holders will still be able to park in any of our car parks free of charge.

Aylesbury Shopmobility has 13 scooters, 10 wheelchairs and 3 electric wheelchairs which can be used FREE of charge by those people who find it difficult getting out and for shopping and leisure purposes. You do not need to be a registered orange badge holder to use our facilities. You may have broken your leg/ankle, had an operation, or have any number of illnesses. You will be able to park in one of our dedicated parking spaces collect a vehicle from a member of staff and take advantage of all the new facilities Aylesbury has to offer. If you wish to arrive by public transport if we are given prior notice we can arrange for someone to meet you at a chosen time.

If you would like to regain your independence but you have never used an electric vehicle before please inform us. They are very easy to use and a member of staff will be happy to give you all the guidance and training needed.

Perhaps you would like to go on Holiday or for a weekend away. If so we also operate a short-term wheelchair or scooter hire scheme for a very low cost.

The scheme has been very successful since its introduction in November 1997. We are fast approaching our 5000th user and will be celebrating this achievement with a prize for this person from Beattie's department store. Who knows, this could be you. 


Things you can do to help:

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

News From Aston Abbotts Helipad

Heavy Air Traffic Restrictions Imposed

Helicopter movements at the Aston Abbotts Helipad may have to be revised. A letter received from Luton Airport Air Traffic Centre dictates that as radio contact with Luton cannot be established on the ground, departing helicopters must remain below 500 feet above ground level until radio contact is made and air traffic clearance obtained.

It transpires that with the proposed new departure and arrival routes for Luton's westerly runway there could be a conflict. Upon pressing the point further I was told that failure to conform would mean the withdrawal of our Helipad licence.



Further inquiries have revealed that the sewage treatment plant just inside Cold Comfort farm is to be the location for the radio holding beacon for the approach to this runway.

This means that during busy periods heavy jets will be following a holding pattern around this beacon, slowly descending to the base level before being called off the stack for clearance to land. This base level could be as low as 2500 feet.

I have voiced my disapproval of these restrictions and the location of the beacon. Aston Abbotts Helipad has been in operation for just over a year with very easy departure & arrival procedures, these new restrictions will make operations much more difficult with probably greater noise levels because of the extra hovering required on departures.

This latest blow to the Helipad follows last year's EU decision to scrap Duty Free allowances, forcing the abandonment of our plans to make chartered off-shore flights to L'Isle de Chiens (somewhere to the south) for Duty Free shopping.

Watch this space for future developments.

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

THE VILLAGE INTERVIEW

This month Phil Spooner speaks to Colin Higgs

A fourth generation Astonian, Colin Higgs was born in Grantham and came to Aston Abbots as a baby when his father and mother returned here to seek housing. As a child he lived on Lines Hill by the nearest of the four gates that used to be on the road to Weedon. "All the gates in those days used to be shut, so if we saw a car or horse and cart coming along we'd open the gate and he would give us a penny. Mind you, there was nothing like the traffic there is now - we probably only had thruppence a day." In 1938 the family moved to a newly built house in the Wingrave Road, where Colin and his mother still live today.

Colin attended the village school, as did his three brothers and sisters. "We had 110 children in school. Brilliant school! Brilliant school! Very strict teachers, pity they're not like it today!"

He recalls being a wartime village child. "During the war we had to catch white butterflies... they were doing so much damage to the crops. We also got paid for collecting blackberries and elderberries because they used those for dye for the army uniforms. We used to have good time with the Czechoslovakians and the Polish prisoners. They [the prisoners] used to give us a good Christmas party up Norduck Lane in the Nissen huts." After completing his schooling in Wing, he worked locally and did two years National Service before joining Marley Tiles in Leighton Buzzard, where he remained for 35 years.

Colin is an active churchgoer. "We've always been involved, my grandfather before me, my father. I've just carried on doing it. My grandfather was the Sexton at the Church. He was also the gravedigger. He wound the clock. My father carried it on. I didn't dig the graves but I carried on with the clock and Church duties."

Voicing frustration at current apathy towards the Church - "I just don't know why people just don't come to Church" - he has no doubt that it is still important to the village. "Oh indeed, indeed! If we lost it, it would be terrible. Catastrophic! Like it was when we lost the school... when we lost the vicar and so they sold the vicarage... when we lost the post office. It was a tragedy when we lost the chapel, but it would be an even greater tragedy if we lost the Church."

An eager volunteer, it is unsurprising to find that he used to organise the annual fete. "I did the festival for ten years. We used to have it in the Abbey grounds. Unfortunately the last year we had it there, which I think was about 1972, they got burgled three times. The insurers told the lady at the Abbey they wouldn't insure it because they thought the people that came to the fete had eyed it up. She reluctantly had to refuse us. We then moved into the vicarage, which was very cramped. Then somebody said 'why don't we use the Green' and that is how it started on the Green."

Colin is a keen member of the Rambling Club. "I am a founder member of that. It started in 1973." However, one of their walks was not so enjoyable for him. "We were doing a walk, we actually started it at Cublington, to Whitchurch and then down to Dunton and back to Cublington and we got over

this stile and it was a hot day and the sun was sort of shimmering. We jumped over this and it looked just like tarmac on the end of a farm building - it looked just like tarmac - and it was cow slurry. And I went in it! I could have drowned. It was a pool, there was nothing to say and with the sun shimmering down it just looked like tarmac and I was the first one-over so I just jumped over and jumped in it. They got me out. The smell was unbelievable... terrible... terrible!"

Each week he writes the Aston Abbotts village report for the Leighton Buzzard Observer. "I used to do it for the Bucks Herald, but I fell out with them because they never used to report it correctly or they would leave it for about three weeks and put it in when it would be stale news."

What does he like most about Aston Abbotts? "Everything! It's a good village, good community. Everybody gets on all right. Most of the newcomers have fitted in well." The biggest challenge is? "To keep it as a rural village. We must grow though to keep it alive, but within reason. We've lost the blacksmith's shop – that's all developed. We've lost Nash's farm... we've lost the apple scrumping Orchard – that's Ross Road now. You've got to have development. You've got have new people to create new ideas. You've got to grow otherwise the place dies.

"There used to be about four shops at one time, little cottage shops, you know. There were less than half the houses that there are now, but the families were bigger you see. Nobody left the village. You walked to the shops and nobody left the village. Yes, a lot of villages have lost all of their shops - it's awful really. All these out-of-town supermarkets are disastrous really. Lots of villages are losing all of their facilities and the people who move in mostly commute. Sadly, a lot of them don't mix in with anything you've got in the village."

Colin serves on the Bucks County Council Highways (Road Safety) committee, Aylesbury Vale Rural Transport committee, Ramblers, Whist club, Floral Club, Marley Pensioners Link committee, and Good Samaritan bingo committee. He contributes history articles to the Chronicle, cuts the Church grass and he is an enthusiastic Church fundraiser. On top of these he made a field map and conducted interviews for the Aston Abbotts History Society, yet he still finds time to make homemade wine from locally gathered wild ingredients.

His involvement in village and local activities led to him winning the award for Aylesbury Vale Parish Volunteer Of The Year in 1998. "Well, I went into the shop one morning, Bernard's wife Valerie was in there and she said 'I've just filled in and posted a form about you'. I said 'Whatever about' and she said 'I hope you'll know some time'. Anyway I never thought anymore about it and about six weeks later I suddenly get a phone call from Aylesbury Vale... We didn't know anything about it at all."

The award may have amazed Colin, but it is unlikely that anybody who has met him and seen his contributions to our village community would have shared his surprise.

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IN THE VILLAGE 5. SNIPPETS FROM THE VILLAGE MEETING

For the 300 or so Aston Abbottsonians unable to make it to the village meeting, here are a few sound bites from the evening's proceedings.....

NEW FACE ON THE BEAT

Say a big helio to PC Buckle, our new beat Constable. PC Buckle explained to the Village Meeting that PC Griggs has moved to Wendover and his old patch has been split between the three remaining PCs at Wing.

Although his patrol now covers a very wide area of rural Bucks, PC Buckle hopes to visit Aston Abbotts on a regular basis and will deal with any village issues as and when they arise.

If you need to talk directly to PC Buckle, call Aylesbury police on 01296 396163 or 396000, ask if he is on patrol and if so, ask the operator to contact him for you (at Wing Police Station there is only a rather unreliable answer machine).

NEW SPEED TRAPS

Speeding drivers be warned. Wing Police now have a calibrated speedo in their patrol car and so can carry out on the spot speed checks. Previously, any speed traps or checks needed to be carried out by the traffic patrol from Aylesbury.

CONMEN ALERT

Watch out, watch out there's a conman about - well, quite a few actually.

PC Buckle reported that there has recently been a spate of conmen preying on the elderly. One ruse is to say that they are from the Electricity Board and wish to pay you £100 to help them, apparently by holding a plug. While you are distracted they enter your property and steal cash, pension books and so on.

There are countless other scams to look out for - the best advice is to not let ANYONE into your house without a prior appointment. Always check that their ID is bona fide and if the caller is unexpected but seems genuine, call their office (Gas Board, BT, EEB etc.) to check their authenticity.

IF IN DOUBT, KEEP THEM OUT.

PEDLAR OR BURGLAR?

When is a Pedlar not a Pedlar (and what is a Pedlar, in any case?).

During the meeting, PC Buckle was asked to clear up the issue of Pedlars - those men who knock on our doors every few months, flash an ID card and proceed to try to sell household items from their bag.

PC Buckle explained that there are genuine Pedlars. They are given a certificate by their local Police Force which carries a written description of the individual but no photograph. This certificate confirms that they have not been convicted of an offence. Most seem to come from the Nottingham area for some reason.

Legal Pedlars can only sell door-to-door, on the spot - they can not take orders for future delivery. Anyone trying to get you to pay now for delivery of goods at a later date is NOT legitimate.

Similarly, if the Pedlar on your door step has photo ID, he or she is NOT legitimate and is possibly sizing up your house for later burglary.

Remember, you don't have to buy anything from them, no matter how sad their story might be.

NEW FETE COMMITTEE

Gordon Smith reported that a new team has volunteered to organise the fete and that plans are underway and some bookings have already been made.

The meeting thanked Barbara and David for all their efforts in organising the fete over recent years, and also David Watts who has stepped down as Treasurer.

The team will report developments in **THE CHRONICLE** and will need a large number of volunteers to help on the day to ease the pressure on the committee. Distribution of the proceeds from the fete was discussed and agreed, and will be reported later.

THE CHURCH ROOM

Tom Manning reported that progress with the Church Room improvements is gathering pace and moving faster than even he dared hope.

As reported in THE

CHRONICLE, pledges of financial support from individuals and village funds have already covered the costs of all initial legal work and planning applications and may even pay for a few bricks.

Tom's appeal for help has met with a fantastic response. We now have a grants co-ordinator and clerk, a number of volunteers for decorating and a long list of others willing to give their time. If you would like to volunteer, contact Tom.

Tom, who will chair the improvements' team, will hold a meeting in the near future to get things organised - he will contact people direct.

In the meantime, keep an eye open in **THE CHRONICLE** for further updates.

AAH - ASTON ABBOTTS HISTORY

Claire Shorrock told the meeting that the exhibition had been a terrific success with hundreds of visitors from all over the Vale attending - the visitors' book was full of compliments.

Sales of the book are going very well, with only a hundred or so left (hurry to secure your copy). The team is now finalising the contents of the village archive which will be placed in a chest in The Church for future generations.

The AAH has been so successful that it has been able to contribute £1,000 towards the Church Room improvements.

REC COMMITTEE WRECKED

We recently reported that the Recreation Ground committee has disbanded due to lack of support. All Rec matters will now pass to the Parish Council. A significant sum of money remains in the Rec account for use on future Rec projects.

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RECTOR'S REPORT -

Even though the letter explained what it was, it took me a few minutes to get my bearings when I first looked at the photograph that I had been sent. It was a photograph of a partly demolished Church.

The Church at which I started my Ministry was very clearly at the end of its Ministry. The Nave arches were still standing, and there was a large pile of rubble, but that was about all. Rather a sad photograph, yet one that brought back some happy memories.


It had been a large Victorian Church on a very prominent street corner that could seat about 800 people. A local man had had it built, as a memorial to himself. He was, as they say, "not short of a bob-or-two". For Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee, he had added the tower, clock, and organ so that people would remember him more!

It had, largely due to one former Vicar, a very impressive set of Victorian stained-glass windows. These have, I believe, been preserved, and are now in storage.

The demolition was necessary because the Church had been built without adequate foundations, and had become structurally unsafe.

I am writing about it because the Church was dedicated to St. George, the English Saint. On March 1st, there were people proudly wearing daffodils for St. David. On March 17th there were celebrations for St. Patrick. The Scots seem to have transferred their allegiance from St. Andrew (30th Nov) to (St.?) Robbie Burns on January 25th.

Of course, celebrating St. George this year will be less easy – because St. George's Day happens to coincide with Easter (April 23rd). But, there seems to me to have been a marked increase in the way that the Welsh, the Irish and the Scots have been encouraged to mark their national days, and a significant



decrease in interest for the English Saint.

Some claim that St. George is a Saint who has no foundations in fact,

although the same could equally be said about many other Saints. We do not know very much about any of them. Yet one of the characteristics that unites them is their Christian faith. Myth and legend may surround their lives, but all of them shared a belief in Jesus Christ Risen from the dead.

It doesn't matter very much whether the story of St. George and the Dragon is true or not — or whether we can relate that story to the constant battle that we are called to wage against the powers of evil and wickedness. The Easter story fits very closely with his — the victory of Good over Evil. I am sure that we should be celebrating St. George more than we do.

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WINGRAVE SCHOOL APPEAL

As you may have read in the local papers, Wingrave C of E Combined School has to make a difficult decision. If it cannot raise additional funds it will be necessary to make a teacher redundant and increase the class sizes. Parents are being asked to make voluntary contributions and donations from the local community are also being sought. Below is a letter from the Governors.

CAN YOU HELP SAVE YOUR SCHOOL?

Wingrave School is forecasting a loss of £23,000 by March next year despite assuming generous support from the School Association. Neither we nor the LEA (Local Education Authority) can accept this. Yesterday's Budget should help but will not remove the problem.

Without extra money, we will have to merge years 3, 4, and 5 into two classes from September, "saving" a full time teacher. If parents and the community together give the school enough help to clear this loss, then we can keep one teacher per age group.

Why the loss?

- Most of our LEA money is an allocation per child and our numbers are too low until 2002.
- 87% of our annual costs are for staff.

We need to know very soon what support is available in case we have to make a redundancy. Are you prepared to help? *Please* be as generous as you can. Arrangements are now being made for donations to be made through Gift Aid to gain a tax advantage.

JOTTINGS FROM THE CHALK FACE

Some years ago I worked throughout the County of Buckinghamshire as an Advisory Teacher. I worked as part of a team of four and our job was to help primary teachers teach 'proper' science, a subject that filled many of them with foreboding. This was in pre National Curriculum days and science up until that time involved little more than a jar of tadpoles on a Nature Table.

I very much enjoyed a job that involved travelling the length and breadth of the county and enabled me to work in over fifty different schools. I also had the privilege of meeting and helping some remarkably gifted teachers, some of whom were working in difficult schools with underprivileged children.

An exceptional teacher needs to have a number of different qualities, one of the most important of which is the ability to be able to inspire children. An exceptional teacher will also be prepared, at times, to take risks.

I remember Paul very clearly. He had long hair, arrived at school just before the bell and had a thoroughly dishevelled look about

him. But his eyes sparkled, he had an infectious grin and the kids loved him!

Paul was doing some work on Archaeology as part of his History topic with 8 year-olds. He wanted his children to experience something of the thrill that an archaeologist would experience when they unearth an important find.

The school sandpit would be a good place to start suggested Paul so he armed each child with a spoon, yoghurt pot and paintbrush and off they set. An unpromising place to excavate you might think but unbeknown to the children and to me Paul had been in action the previous night! He had buried beneath the sand a full size human skeleton that he had borrowed from the local upper school! I can remember the excitement following that first cry of "I've found something" and the enthusiasm generated by this first experience of archaeology will have lasted a lifetime. An inspirational teacher I have no doubt who operated with great effect without constraint. Would he be as content today? I wonder?



The closing date for applications is 1st May 2000 - for more information and a nomination form, call 01296 585060 or 01296 585055 (minicom).












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
