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
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In The Village

Anita has taken a well earned retirement after over 30 years of teaching, 20 of those at The Sir Henry Floyd Grammar School, in Aylesbury where she was Head of Technology.

It is a mark of their respect for her by former pupils that they will literally rush up to her in the street or other such places and start the conversation "'ello Miss..." and then proceeded to tell how they were doing at college or university, where they were living, how many children they had, etc. Anita is always able to recollect their names, which year they were in, the sort of marks they got and whether they were 'good or naughty'. She especially relishes the ones earmarked as 'naughty' coming up and delightedly showing that they had made good.

Anita is well known at the school for devoting a lot of time outside classroom hours to encouraging and listening to individual pupils. She has also been involved extensively in the extracurricular activity running adventure courses, ski trips and the biennial education cruise to the eastern Mediterranean, Egypt and the Pyramids as well as making up to a 100 costumes for school plays.

She has survived an OFSTED inspection (just) and also gone through 2 thresholds as recognition of her skills and the extra that she brought to the job, the pupils and the school.

Her teaching career has ranged from Bath to Leicester and then to the slopes of Mount Kilimanjaro in Kenya. This is where she met and encouraged many of the emerging Kenyan Athletes.

On the return to the UK she joined Lord Bill's in Thame before moving to the SHFGS.

Last year one of her pupils achieved marks which were in the top 5 of the whole of the country and Anita received a special recognition of this by the exam board. Other pupils won and achieved runner up in the annual 'Chef of Year' competition

Yet retirement is only partial as she will return to impart her wisdom for 2 days a week and try to play golf with some of the spare time, or play Granny to little Lili.

In the meantime she has to brace herself for another one of those "Oh, 'ello Miss...."

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Schools Promotions Update

In behalf of Wingrave School we would like to thank everyone who has donated tokens or vouchers for the following schools promotions and this is how the school has benefited:

Nestle

Under this scheme £63 was raised this year which went towards the purchase of garden benches and picnic tables in the school's courtyard development. This scheme resumes again in September.

Tesco

So far 21,276 vouchers have been counted, making a total of 28,771 with those banked last year. The school has decided this year to use 26,000 purchasing an Epson projector, which when linked to a computer will enable the clear projection of bright, vivid computer images even in well-lit classrooms. We have until 19 September to bank those for use next year.


Persil

Rectors Report

"Of course, it is only a tidying up exercise!"

A "tidying up exercise" is something that I try to achieve in my study from time to time. But, over a considerable number of years I have learnt that tidiness is not one of my strong points. No matter how many black bags full of rubbish get thrown out, there still remains more. There are the things that are "in the process" - put down until they can be completed, - or until a more suitable home can be found for them. When you buy "two for the price of one". then the second one needs to be kept somewhere! Many of the things that I need to house are not like pieces of paper that can be stored in a filing cabinet, although, thinking about it, it would be nice if the filing cabinets were less full.

One thing that I have learnt is that the things that get thrown away are usually the things that are needed very shortly afterwards. That makes me somewhat suspicious of attempts to tidy up.

So many problems in our world are caused because people make assumptions about others. If we took more trouble to establish the true facts, then we would not make so many mistakes. If the assumptions that you make at the outset are wrong, then everything that follows is quite likely to be wrong too. No amount of subsequent tidying up will bring back the things that have been irretrievably lost through our over-zealous efforts at tidying up.

The thought of tidying up usually brings to my mind "babies" and "bath water". But perhaps I will aim to fill a few more black sacks this summer, just to prove that I am not totally opposed to moderate tidying up!

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

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
