





CHICKEN FARM UPDATE

Following our failure to convince the Court of Appeal that Aylesbury Vale District Council had acted illegally in granting permission for the chicken farm at Norduck, our legal team made an appeal to the European Commission and the following is the skeleton of the complaint:

"An important issue is arising relating to how the UK authorities deal with the question of <u>mitigation measures</u> when deciding whether a project is likely to have significant environmental effects and therefore require an Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA).



Briefly: planning authorities, with the recent support of the Court of Appeal, take the approach that mitigation measures can normally be taken into account in the decision as to whether a project is likely to have significant environmental effects or not and therefore whether EIA is required.

Furthermore, that decision is a matter of judgment of the local planning authority, and is therefore effectively unchallengeable

This leads members of the public effectively unable to comment on the project in question (and indeed the proposed mitigation measures) in circumstances where it would be common ground that without the mitigation measures significant environmental effects would be likely.

As mitigation measures are central to the development of effective EIA and its role in preventing and alleviating potential socio-environmental harm, the interpretation of the EU legislation by the Court of Appeal is of wide concern.

The effect of the domestic courts' approach is that the EIA process is being side-stepped and the mitigation measures being relied upon are not being subject to adequate scrutiny that would arise under EIA procedures.

We submit that this is contrary to the intent of the EIA Directive."

The European Commission replied, "On the basis of our assessment, we have decided to open a new complaint against the United Kingdom and will seek clarification from the United Kingdom authorities with regards to the issue raised in your complaint."

We now await the result from their enquiries with the UK government and that might not be available until some time in the distant future. Dickie Dicken





ALLOTMENT DIARY

Browsing through the catalogues with a view to ordering this season's vegetables, I could not help but look at the pages encouraging me to buy plants for the garden as well. These were frequently divided up into perennials, biennials and hardy annuals, and I was reminded of Katherine Whitehorn's definition of these:-

"Perennials are the ones that grow like weeds, biennials are the ones that die this year rather than next and hardy annuals are the ones that never come up at all."

Meanwhile down on the allotments, things are now in full swing. Most of my fellow gardeners have put me to shame by digging over and spreading manure on their allotments, and their plots are looking immaculate, whereas mine still looks awful The only plea in mitigation that I can offer is that my son Adam has a large and very efficient Rotavator, which can plough the allotment in a few hours; and I feel it would be churlish of me to dig my allotment myself, and rob him of the opportunity to perform for me this small service of filial duty.

I was a bit worried when Gordon appeared to have dug a double grave on his allotment, and then lined it with bricks. However, when I visited the allotments today, it seemed to have nothing more sinister in it than a couple of blueberry bushes.

A nice gardening story for you from the village, which I will pass on; even though the subject of it is not an allotment holder. (Indeed, most of us did not even know that he gardened). To save his blushes I will preserve his anonymity. He decided to plant out in his garden some plants he had acquired. When he looked at his bag of compost, he found that, not having used any compost for at least a year, the compost was full of weeds. Being a resourceful chap he thought that what he could do to kill the weeds, was to put the compost in his microwave oven, and microwave it. He did this, and it appeared to be successful.

He therefore decided to do another batch, and while this was cooking, went upstairs to do some work on his computer. After a few minutes he could smell burning, and when he went out onto the landing, there was smoke coming up the stairs. 

Countryside Matters

As I write this column at the end of February the sun is shining. Lambs are now in the field at Mentmore and the Ascott farms are busy drilling field beans, trying to avoid dropping them into wet holes.

Due to a few frosty days the tractors are able to travel on top of the ground in the tramlines, so all the crops have had their first dose of nitrogen top dressing.

The oil seed rape has had a torrid time over winter. Firstly, the seedbeds were difficult to prepare resulting in the crop being drilled into some rough cloddy, dry beds. Add to this a drought of many weeks and the germination was pretty terrible. In the autumn some fields were pulled up and replanted, many far to late for another crop of rape, those that survived were then hit by the pigeons in their thousands. Pigeons this time of the year come from everywhere including from over the channel to find Brassica crops. They only need a small bare patch to get started and then they can strip a field of its crop in weeks. Shooting is one answer but one shot and they are gone. You need to shoot 200-300 a day to make any inroads into the flocks. They are likely now to leave the rape alone and start on the beans.

Our 'friends', have now started hare coursing again, in the fields below Wingrave towards the A418 and Lower Wingbury farm. Only this week, they were seen being dropped off in the lay-by opposite the telephone exchange and picked up in Abbott's way. They killed a deer at Helsthorpe last week and were caught at Ledburn Farm the week before. These people are dangerous and violent and should not be approached. Users of our local footpaths and dog walkers need to be extremely vigilant and should keep their dogs at heel or on a lead and carry a mobile phone to call the police if they spot anything.

The litter on the sides of the Stoke Hammond bypass is a total disgrace. This time it is not all the fault of the general public that throw their McDonalds out of their car windows. Most of the problem seems to be with 'The London Waste' juggernauts that come to the tip at Bletchley, which is right at the end of the by pass. While they are full they have got their sheets and nets securely fixed over their load, however on their return journey, when empty, the wind blows out all the remaining rubbish that has stuck to the sides of the lorries. How come nobody prosecutes these hauliers?? The police are quick enough to catch speeding motorists but that, of course, is making money. Clearing up the rubbish with offenders or folk with community service orders costs money and is also politically incorrect, how silly of me.


For me it was a very special event since they must have been told it was my birthday and so their opening number was a lovely 'jazzed up' version of 'Happy Birthday' sung especially to me.

Church Path



Those of you who have used the Church path during recently, cannot fail to have noticed that the surface is beginning to break up to a point where it is uncomfortable to walk on and may well soon become quite dangerous. It is in any event too heavily cambered, un-edged, and in places too low relative to the grass on either side, creating un-necessary difficulties for our hard pressed 'Merry Mowers'.

A specification has been written to address these and other improvements, your PCC. have 'scoured their coffers' to find the cash to pay for it and tenders sought,. We are pleased to announce that 'Inside Out's' submission was the most attractive to the PCC. We still need a final OK from Church HQ. Oxford, before the work can 'go ahead' but it is anticipated a completely new path should be laid this summer It is to be a 'rolled gravel' path which will be level

with the gate sill and church porch enabling better wheelchair access. The work will also include new wiring to the original lantern next to the gate, which, with the existing light on the porch will provide greatly improved lighting along it's length.

Since the existing path will have to be completely removed we are taking the opportunity to have waste water and fresh water pipes laid (but not yet connected) in anticipation of toilet and limited kitchen facilities being installed some time in the future.

Aston Abbotts Parish Council Wednesday 27th February 2008

Present: -

Cllrs. C Higgs, D Dicken, K Curry, J Hardcastle, P Shorrock and P Bruton (Clerk). There were three members of the public in attendance.

Apologies had been received from R Clarke and A Stefancyzk

The Planning Committee notified the Council of the following decisions that had been made at the Sub Committee meeting on the 27th February 2008:

08/00211/APP (67 The Green, Aston Abbotts) Single storey front extension, two storey side and rear extensions and conservatory to facilitate division of one dwelling into two.

RESOLVED to raise no objections to this application, however Council would point out to AVDC that given the application was creating a terrace the current proposed extension was in breach of existing planning regulations as detailed in Design Guide 3.

08/00068/APP (Land at Moat Farm Stud,) Relocation of Access

RESOLVED to support this application given the improvement to Road Safety.

We had received details from the Biodiversity Partnership of forthcoming events covering the duties placed on local authorities with regard to the conservation of biodiversity. It was AGREED we would attend the presentation on the 23rd April in Aylesbury.

The meeting was updated on the progress of the Village Plan and the target date for the production of the consultation questionnaire was early April 2008. It would be published in the Chronicle and sent to all residents

Following a recent Transport Symposium held in Aylesbury it was reported that the main thrust of the day was aimed at developing the Aylesbury hub given the housing development and growth plans for the town. A number of issues that affected the Village were raised, however given the main emphasis there seemed to be little recognition of the problems we encountered.

It was noted that the drainage of surface water since the development of Hunters Way gave cause for concern and did not appear adequate. It was AGREED that Council should write to Highways and AVDC Planning to ascertain what provisions had been made within the development proposals and request remedial action to rectify the situation.


District Councillor Peter Cooper was present and gave the following report:

A418 Improvements – Currently Bucks CC was putting in a new bid to South East England Regional Assembly (SEERA), the 1st phase was from the A505 to the Hulcott Cross Roads and the 2nd from Hulcott Cross Roads to A41 South. There was a delay in getting the forms through and it was expected the bid would be presented at the end of March with a decision by December. He then gave an overview of current plans surrounding the growth of Aylesbury and in particular the impact on local transport links and facilities to encourage industry and create jobs in the area. The anticipated increase in vehicle movement along the A418 was from current levels of 17,500 per day to 26,000 per day by 2016. He advised that the public and Parish Councils were petitioning SEERA and it was AGREED to discuss at next month's meeting to consider the action Council would take

The scope of work with Buckland Landscapes on the acquired parcel of land on the Recreation ground had been agreed clearing would now commence.

It was reported that nothing had been heard from GB Sports and after discussion it was AGREED to contact our advisor and obtain his authority to use his informal report. GB Sports would then be contacted direct to ascertain when they proposed to carry out the remedial works.

It was confirmed that the next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 9th April at 20.00 in the Church Room







Indoor Skydiving

Indoor skydiving might seem a rather strange concept, but it has one major advantage over the real thing: you don't have to jump out of an aircraft.

Airkix is located at the rear of the Xscape building in Milton Keynes. The rather odd-looking tall building houses a vertical wind tunnel. Here anybody from an absolute beginner to an expert can practice sky diving techniques without all that nonsense with aircraft, parachutes, and mind-numbingly terrifying heights.

My Kixstart introductory package – a Christmas present from Carol - entitled me to training, loan of protective clothing, two one-minute "flights", and a DVD of my experience.

Your session must be booked in advance and you have to report an hour before your flight. There were about a dozen in our introductory session. The instructor gives you a briefing, shows you a short training DVD, and makes sure that you know the four simple hand signals he will use in the rather noisy flight chamber. Soon we were kitted out in flying suit (worn over normal jeans and T-shirt), helmet, goggles and optional earplugs. Filing into the viewing area, we had a chance to watch the previous session finishing their flights.

The flight chamber is a transparent Perspex vertical tunnel about 4-5 metres across, with an outer waiting area and a public viewing section. I was rather relieved that the large rotating fan blades I had envisaged did not occupy the bottom of the chamber — it was just a steel wire mesh floor with an empty room below. The four 250-watt fans are located at the top of the building, way out of sight.

The instructor enters the chamber and beckons each of you to take your first flight in rotation. Each person gets one minute and the instructor is with you all the time to ensure that you get the best experience. Two people went before me, and then it was my turn.


At the door of the chamber I leant forward into the rushing wind. The instructor took hold of handles on my suit to steady me as my feet left the ground - and I was flying. My first flight was taken up mainly with getting used to the experience and finding the correct flight position. I found the sensation of air rushing past my face at terminal velocity quite exhilarating. It was noisy not too much - and not too difficult to breathe. A minute doesn't sound very long, but it's a good time for getting used to it. Time's up - the instructor pushes you out of the door, and you sit on the bench and watch as the rest of your group have their first flight.

We had been told that the instructor would respond to whoops of enjoyment by giving us a more exhilarating experience. Unfortunately one woman was a shrieker. As she screamed the instructor, possibly swayed by the fact she was young and pretty, responded by taking hold and performing some pretty energetic swoops and dives with her on her maiden flight. This made her shriek even more! She looked a little shocked when she emerged from the chamber, but she enjoyed it. My second flight was much better than my first. Once the instructor recognises that you have a basic grasp of what to do he starts flying with you to give you more fun. The operator sitting outside the chamber increases the fan speed while the instructor whirls you around and flies you up and down in the 5-6 metre high chamber. I thoroughly enjoyed the experience, although it was clear that two in our group were not so keen, including a 7-8 year old girl. When at the end of the session the instructor explained he had a few minutes in hand and a couple of us could have an extra minute for a tenner, I immediately said, "That'll be me then". My third flight was even more fun as the instructor rapidly flew me up and down and around like the young woman earlier although I shrieked a lot less.

I was impressed with the organisation, friendliness and professionalism of the Airkix staff, particularly the way the instructor looked after and encouraged the little girl who was a bit frightened. It was a fun experience, very safe, and not particularly strenuous.

The Kixstart experience I had cost around £35, with another £15 for the (optional) DVD. It gets cheaper on repeat visits. Find out more at www.airkix.co.uk. I asked my instructor if it was anything like the real thing. He said that it was actually more difficult in the tunnel. No matter – you're not going to catch me jumping out of an aircraft any time soon.

Changes to concessionary travel (bus passes)

From 1 April this year, there's a major change to the bus pass scheme. Until now, residents aged 60 and over and disabled people have been eligible for free bus travel on journeys that start or finish in Aylesbury Vale. The government has now changed the scheme to allow all residents of England to travel free of charge on all local buses. For example, someone living in Aylesbury Vale can use local buses in London or anywhere else in England after 1 April.

All existing bus pass holders will be issued with a new style 'smart card' bus pass. They do not have to do anything – the new pass and an explanatory letter will be sent to them in the post. Anyone who does not currently have a bus pass can request an application form by ringing 01296 585656. Forms are also available from our offices in Aylesbury, Winslow and Buckingham. In addition to the application form, new applicants will need to provide a passport style photo and proof of their age and where they live. Dave Lewis Hit By Budget

Alistair Darling's first budget has hit hard at Church Farm. Mr Dave Lewis explains, "The 14p tax increase on a bottle of champagne is monstrous. I can no longer afford to go out on a Saturday. It's definitely not a rise in taxation."
