



Thames Diamond Jubilee Pageant, Sunday 3 June

Up to a thousand boats will muster on the river as The Queen prepares to lead one of the largest flotillas ever seen on the River Thames.

Tickets are still available for the Diamond Jubilee festival in London's Battersea Park, which will offer a great vantage point to view the pageant. The festival will celebrate design, music, art, film, fashion and food from the past 60 years. Members of the public will also be able to watch the pageant on a number of big screens. Judy's brother-in-law is one of the crew rowing a Cornish gig behind the Queen's barge. He's over 70 and this will be a test of fitness if nothing else. The Cornish pilot gig is a six-oared rowing boat, built of Cornish narrow leaf elm, 32 feet (9.8 m) long with a beam of four feet ten inches. It is recognised as one of the first shore-based lifeboats that went to vessels in distress, with recorded rescues going back as far as the late 17th century. Ed



THE LADY IN THE VAN

What would you do if an eccentric old lady took up residence outside your house in a battered camper van? That was the question that confronted the writer Alan Bennett in 1971 when Miss Shepherd appeared in his street. Initially parking further down the road she was moved on several times until she came to stop outside Bennett's house. The bitter sweet comic play Bennett subsequently wrote about the nearly 20 years that followed before her death in 1989 was performed by the Hull Truck Theatre in Aylesbury recently to a pathetically small audience.

The play obviously tells the story of the main events of that time. It was certainly an eventful stay beautifully chronicled by Bennett who is famous for his observational descriptions of ordinary people. After several years and various complaints she was banned from living on the road so simply moved into Bennett's garden. Miss Shepherd's personal hygiene left a lot to be desired and as time wore on her van became more disgusting and dirty. She finally died there after an unsuccessful attempt to trick her into going into a care home. During these years a succession of social workers visited but took little action in the face of her outright hostility. She saw these officials purely as a means of getting various concessions, whether really needed or not, such as walking sticks and chairs. In the play this army of social workers is represented by just one, Miss Ferris, carrying her notebook, typically full of good advice but short on delivery.

Miss Shepherd busied herself writing political pamphlets under the title of TRUE VIEW. She was deeply religious and had frequent visions of the Blessed Virgin Mary. She was generally reclusive and hated any noise, even music, she even put chewing gum on Bennett's front gate to deaden the irritating noise. It emerged later that she had shown early musical talent as a pianist. During her various manic episodes the hostile attitude of her convent school to her talent is mentioned often suggesting that it was the crushing of her musical ambitions that was the cause of her mental illness. After her death it was discovered that as a young woman she had been committed to a mental institution but had escaped and remained free for 101 days so that she could not be sent back. From that time on she had apparently led an itinerant lifestyle.

The play raised a number of questions not only about Miss Shepherd but about Bennett himself. In the play he seems to be exploring his actions, or lack of them. He does this by using 2 actors to play himself. One presents the outer person and other his subconscious, intellectual self who immediately spots the writing material offered by the situation and seems to delight in the more bizarre events that followed. At her funeral he is disappointed she does not leap out of her coffin in a dramatic resurrection. So it is that the audience could think Bennett took no action to remove the lively but smelly old lady because he saw a good story. We also learn that at about the same time his own mother had fallen into a deep depression and was subsequently committed to a home. In the play Bennett seems to portray himself as helpless in the face of his mother's illness and gradual decline and it may have been that guilt about this stopped him getting Miss Shepherd removed. Alternatively it could be that Bennett was just too weak to make a fuss and just accepted the easy option of doing nothing. If that is the case then this story shows that inaction has as many consequences as action. For Miss Shepherd Bennett's resigned acceptance and lack of interference seems to have been just what she was looking for.

Buckingham Palace has published full details of the processional route, and the events will be shown on big screens in Hyde Park, St James's Park and Trafalgar Square.







(JUST) BACK ON THE ALLOTMENT DIARY

Well, twelve weeks has now passed since my operation, and I am allowed back on to the allotment – just in time, having regard to the number of weeds that are growing. And, very fortunately, my licence to garden again has coincided with an improvement in the weather, so that working there is a good deal more pleasant than it has been for the last few weeks.

It is a well-known saying that every cloud has a silver lining, and that has never been truer than in the last few weeks. The constant grey skies, cold winds and frequent rain have been very depressing, but the relatively cold weather for the time of year has helped by reducing evaporation, and so allowed more rain water to penetrate down to the underground aquifers – so that some areas of the country (unfortunately not this one) have already had their drought orders rescinded, and should reduce the time before we can start using hosepipes again. It has also been the case that there has been absolutely no need to water our growing crops (rarely can a law have been so well observed as the current hosepipe ban: nobody apart from a few dedicated car washers can have wanted to break it!)

Nevertheless my asparagus plants are not enjoying the cool weather: I have never known the spears to grow so slowly.

I had to drive up to Shropshire recently to visit relations, and I was struck on my journey by how many fields were now covered in swathes of yellow, indicating the prevalence of oilseed rape as a crop. (Unhappily, there are also a number of places where it has escaped from the fields and is growing wild alongside the roads: I hope it is not going to join the list of foreign plant species that have now become so prolific in the wild that they have become a nuisance, like giant hogweed, Japanese knotweed and rhododendron). Before the 1970's oilseed rape was virtually unknown here, but I gather it is now our third most commonly grown arable crop. When I was a boy driving around with my parents in their car, to see a field of yellow was both a rarity and a pleasure: as they would always point out to me, it would be a field of mustard, which very few farmers grew around this part of the country.

Another big change from my childhood is the number of magpies one sees. Some bird species may be declining, but the magpie is certainly very much on the increase, They were so rare in my childhood that they would always be pointed out to me, and one of my parents or grand-parents would trot out the rhyme:-

One for sorrow, two for joy

Three for a girl, four for a boy

Five for silver, six for gold

Seven for a secret, never to be told

Since I never remember seeing more than two or three magpies at the same time, I couldn't remember the verse after four, and had to look it up. I discovered there is an alternative version, which I would guess from the last line comes from the north of the country; and this goes

One for sorrow, two for mirth

Three for a funeral, four for a birth

Five for heaven, six for hell

Seven's the de'il, his ane sel'

Northerners must have a more gloomy disposition than we who live south of the Watford Gap! Nowadays magpies are so common, it is rare to drive anywhere without seeing one, and I should think these poems are now totally unknown to the modern generation.

Finally, one staggering piece of allotment-related news: three acres of prime building land in Chelsea which cost the Qatari royal family £246,000,000 are going to be turned into the world's most expensive vegetable garden and orchard. The Qataris bought a 12.8 acre site for £959m in 2008, and were originally planning to erect blocks of flats on the whole area. There was vociferous opposition, however, including a comment from the Prince of Wales that he thought the proposed development was "unsympathetic and unsuitable", so that the planning application was turned down; and the Qataris are now going to use about 3.25 acres for a vegetable patch, including edible flowers, and fruit trees, including 38 varieties of apple, figs, peaches and lemon trees. The idea is that the vegetables and fruit produced will be sold to the many fashionable restaurants in the area. An architect has been charged with producing all this as an attractive feature, and he has said he has been inspired by the Chateau de Villandry in the Loire, whose vegetable gardens are regarded as some of the most beautiful in the world.





Nature Watch: In about three weeks time we will be halfway through the year. Spring has been and gorn and we are now into Summer. Trust me, my Mother was a Doctor!

In March we had some very warm weather and even saw the sun. It was so warm that nature seemed to be about two weeks ahead of normal and then the rain came, and cold! I reckon that the swallows and house martins are about two weeks late now but at least they have mud with which to build nests. Do you remember this time last year the RSPB put out an appeal to make little mud pools to help them because it was so dry.

There are some fledglings about but the weather has been so odd that it is difficult to know what is really going on in nature's secret little homes. Many flowers have already done their work and died back so that their fruiting body with its seed can grow. The most noticeable of these is perhaps the dandelion whose parachute seeds have been in the air for some time and some have already landed in a little niche and germinated to form a new plant. On a little diversion here the name "dandelion" is believed to be an anglisized form of "dents de lion" French for teeth of lion. This is said to be descriptive of the serrated leaf edges. There is a much more descriptive French name - "pissenlit". The last two syllables translate as "in bed" you can translate the first! The leaves are quite pleasant to eat and go well in a mixed salad, just don't eat too much; it is, as the French know, an effective diuretic!

Apart from the trees, and the flowers some folk have planted round them, I have counted about twelve different flowers in the Vic Scott Orchard. For a first spring this isn't bad and there are more to come as we move into Summer. There is also a good variety of grasses. Most of these are much more difficult to tell apart, unless you are an expert, and I'm no expert so I have not attempted a count so far.

Insects are very dependent on suitable temperatures for almost everything they do. Social insects like bees and termites can make small changes to the temperature in their nests or hives by increasing and reducing ventilation but they are still very dependent on the temperature of the day. Rain can also be a problem. Imagine you are a little bee, beevering away! (oh dear) from flower to flower and trying to dodge high speed bodies of water as big as your head or even bigger. Not much fun. However some insects, midges in particular, seem to be able to react to a rise in temperature very quickly and can be seen flying within an hour or so of the sun coming out on a cold day.

Every year is a new adventure. One of the wonders of nature - who can possibly be bored. With the exception of one recalcitrant oak tree this year the oak is very much out before the ash so perhaps we are in for a sploak or should it be a splash?



Minutes of the Aston Abbotts Annual Parish Meeting 8.00pm 9th May, 2012

Present: Mr Peter Shorrock (Chairman, Parish Council), Mr Bob Carvey (acting secretary), Mr Peter Cooper (District Councillor), Ms Paula Boston (PCSO, North Wing) and 16 parishioners.

- 1. Apologies: Mr Richard Clarke, Mr James Perkins, Ms Netta Glover
- 2. The Minutes to the meeting held 11th May, 2011 were approved and signed as a true record
- 3. There was only one matter arising regarding the status of the "village sign", no one present was able to give information on this and the Chairman said he would pass this on to the appropriate persons.
- 4. Councillor Cooper addressed the meeting with a number of updates to local issues affecting Aston Abbotts particularly and the Aylesbury area in general.
- Aylesbury Vale DC have now relocated to the new Gatehouse Road premises, consolidating from some six locations from the early 2000's thus enabling better communications, accessibility for the public, combined IT systems and public meeting rooms.
- In the town the Theatre was doing very well and the new Waitrose and hotel builds were progressing, due for opening around December, 2012/early 2013.
- The proposed new shopping area opposite the theatre along Exchange Street still had negotiations in progress, this re-development it is hoped would bring back shoppers to Aylesbury.
- Planning the central government South East Plan which had 26,500 homes designated for the Aylesbury Vale area is now defunct with no new national plan yet in place. The Aylesbury Vale local plan now being worked on by AVDC planners due for publishing 2013-14 is considering approximately 6,500 homes. In addition private developers have lodged plans for further homes, one of which is some 3,700 at Bierton these private applications create difficulties with the AVDC draft plan. Action groups within the Vale are concerned about effects on local resources as well as the wider use of arterial routes for transport and the general further deterioration of roads in the area. A question left open from the floor asked why with some 19,000 outstanding approved dwellings on AVDC books and developers requests, why were the AVDC planners looking to build a new plan rather than adopt/adapt what was already in existence?
- Some discussion ensued about the progress of HS2 and the possible long term effect of pushing development and traffic the AA side of Aylesbury.
- Rural broadband in North Bucks particularly was known to be bad, a show of hands indicated AA had very mixed reception. Councillor Cooper said there was some thoughts towards improving the Wing South exchange (618xxx numbers) and that a minimum of 100 people, ideally businesses needed to indicate the need and potential sign-up. Up to 20 mbs should be achievable if a fibre-optic can be put to the roadside cabinet.
- Wind Farms two local pending applications at Rowsham/Wingrave and Wing/Cublington. AVDC are putting together a policy on wind farms.
- Luton Airport has applied to expand to double passenger traffic and to add a new runway.
- Bye-Pass -- plans have gone quiet for the three previously proposed routes, however planning enquiries show these three routes still to be protected. It is acknowledged that the A418 is poor quality, but nothing is planned.

The Chairman thanked Councillor Cooper for his expansive and informative report.

- PCSO Boston advised that officers at the Wing Station were consolidating from the north/south coverage and then between them jointly cover the full area with response from Aylesbury or Buckingham as available.
- Overall crime in this area was down 10.8% on the previous year, although burglary of a dwelling was up 20.9% with non-dwelling burglary down 42%. In AA particularly there were 26 reported incidents 2010-11 and on 14 this current year.
- PCSO Boston reminded people of the need to report non-urgent matters to 101 and retain 999 for the
 urgent "it is happening now" calls.

The Chairman thanked PCSO Boston for her report.

- 5. Parish Councils Chairman's Report, Mr Shorrock addressed those present regarding;
- Aston Abbotts Parish Council had applied for funding to complete the second phase of the footpath to the Wingrave crossroads – which was duly completed in the spring. The Parish Council are looking at how completing the last part may be funded.
- In the press you will have seen details on how the government is looking to simplify the planning system through the introduction of the Localism Bill which became law in December, 2011. As part of and to comply with this exercise the Parish Council was required to advise AVDC what the views of the village were with regards to future planning and development the results of the Autumn village questionnaire were analysed and information sent to AVDC.
- The village website is now updated many thanks to Phil Spooner, and Parish Council Minutes are now published on the website and in The Chronicle.

- AVDC announced that they would no longer provide the twice yearly village skip unless the parish pay
 for it. The Parish Council have decided to do so for this coming year and will monitor how much use is
 made of it.
- Bucks County Council are going to remove the road lights at Wingrave crossroads, but the Parish
 Council have agreed to take over and be responsible for the low level lighting by the bus stops on either
 side of the road and I believe Wingrave will similarly adopt lights on their side.
- The Parish Council have agreed to contribute a maximum of £900 towards the activities planned to celebrate the Queens Jubilee in June.
- 6. James Perkins who has been running the last phase of the Village Plan production has asked me to update the meeting regarding this project. It was planned that a final paper version would be available for viewing this evening but printing has been delayed. The final draft is available this evening if anyone would like to look through it. The printed document will be completed with copies sent to AVDC and BCC to facilitate their decision making in respect of the village and any services and in particular aspects contained with the Localism Act. Strategic copies will be placed around the village.

A question was asked from the floor regarding the distribution to each village household – it was agreed to take this question back to Mr Perkins.

- 7. Sally Palmer gave an outline of the planned Queen's Diamond Jubilee Celebrations, largely based on that just published in The Chronicle. She asked for a big push for people to attend, saying that so far approaching £400 had been raised by voluntary donations, some 150 having indicated they are likely to attend. She said that they are very grateful for the offer of marquees and that a team would be needed on the Saturday to help put them up and arrange the Recreation Ground. Plus help on the actual morning to set up tables, the "tea bar" etc. So far expenditure for insurance £50 (via AVDC), singer £300, decorations £240, toilets and a generator had been incurred. Any profits will go to the Fete monies.
- 8. Mr Shorrock updated the meeting as to the status of the village acquiring a lease for the Church Room. It was noted that this purchase had now been going on for many years, the latest situation being that of inaction by the church solicitors (Winkworth Sherwood, Oxford) to complete some small changes to the proposed lease and reissue for signature. From a WS letter dated October, 2011 it seems that the matter could be with the Charity Commission, but no willingness to communicate this would suggest that no action is currently occurring. The Bishop of Oxford has recently been contacted on this matter.
- 9. John Hardcastle reported that The Chronicle was in good shape and that Mr Whyte who handles the finances for the Chronicle was similarly pleased and that reserves were held that would allow production for 6-8 months. A donation from Fete Funds of £500 would be very well received to ensure the sustainability of the Chronicle.
- 10. There being no one attending from the Fete Committee to present an annual report, the Chairman moved the meeting on to decide how the previous year's funds should be distributed. A lively debate was had moving between a stance of "same as last year" to a more focused "what we need now" approach. The final agreement being £500 to The Chronicle, £1000 to the completion of the Wingrave Road footpath fund and the balance to the Church.
- 11. AOB a short update was given on where the Village Plan fits with the soon to be worked on Neighbourhood Plan, this latter document being the key document that fits with the new Aylesbury Vale planning model being developed for government, the Localism Bill and where Aston Abbotts will be affected. It was noted that it will be towards the end of this year before the Parish Council can progress this as information as details are required back from Aylesbury Vale post their first submission to government.

Mr Copping asked about a donation towards the 2012 fireworks and it was agreed to refer this to the next Parish Council meeting.

There being no other business the meeting closed at 9.40pm







Possibly at root it's all about the fact that a teenage girl called Ashleigh and a dog called Pudsey can win Simon Cowell's 'Britain's Got Talent'. We may not go for OTT shows of emotion but we sure love a cute sentimental dog story with loads of 'Ah! factor'!






