Dear Editor - I gather from the February Chronicle that rooks nesting in the trees around The Green are a nuisance. Surely its not just nesting rooks but all natural wild life that causes a problem and needs to be dealt with.

Moles outside Councillor Higgs home are making a serious mess AND a safety hazard on the grass next to the road. Wild foxes have been seen in the village and we villagers can no longer leave our windows open in case grandfather is attacked whilst sleeping. Bumble bees have been setting up home in blue tit boxes, anyone coming within 50 yards is risking life and limb. Jackdaws are nesting in chimneys and blackbirds are so tame that they tap on windows demanding food - whatever next? Possibly a plague of mice moving in from the rough pasture around the village OR, God forbid, an outbreak of salmonella spread by domestic fowl kept behind the Church.

Rabies is, of course, a constant threat from badgers passing TB to alpacas and then alpacas pass on the derivative disease to cats (which live wild round the village). The connection between cats, dogs and rabies is well known.

Surely it is time we felled all the trees round our village (as was so beautifully done with the big chestnut tree) and concrete over the whole area, thus keeping wildlife at bay.

Hopefully a tall light blue fence, entirely in keeping with Nash's Farm, could be erected around sensitive areas that needed extra protection and, if EU grants were available, we could consider netting the village over.

#### The Russian State Ballet of Siberia perform Coppelia at Aylesbury Waterside Theatre.

I went to see this ballet courtesy of the Chronicle, having been lucky enough to win the 'raffle' draw. We had excellent seats in the stalls and were served wine and soft drinks in the interval by a very friendly host.

Coppelia was first staged at the Grand Opera in Paris in 1870. It is apparently, the best-known comedy ballet and features both traditional ballet and national dance - the first ballet to incorporate the latter into ballet. The staging and costumes were bright and colourful and I was pleasantly surprised to find that a lot of the earlier music was familiar, which certainly added to the enjoyment of the first act.

The storyline was quite clear in the first two scenes: Boy, Franz, falls in love with girl, Swanhilda. Franz, is however, also intrigued by Coppelia who is in fact a wooden doll made by her toymaker father, Dr Coppelia. Franz and Swanhilda break into Dr Coppelia's house and unbeknown to Franz, Swanhilda switches place with Coppelia, the doll. When Dr Coppelia catches them dancing he believes that his magic has worked and Coppelia has come to life. (Think of Dick Van Dyke and Benny Hill in Chitty Chitty Bang Bang).

The second act, after the interval, was very brief and contained very little plot. Basically, a large celebration by the villagers as Franz and Swanhilda get married.

I am certainly no expert on ballet but I didn't enjoy this comedy ballet as much as more serious and traditional performances and I am not sure that I appreciated quite so much Hungarian National Dance. Whilst there, I bumped into a friend from the village and she felt the same. Tellingly, there were many empty seats throughout the theatre. The ballet Company were also performing Swan Lake a few days later and I believe that there were few tickets left for this production, which says it all.

All in all an enjoyable evening but I wouldn't rush to see Coppelia again.

### **Countryside Matters**

I have never been slow to criticise the supermarkets. They are no friends to the British farmer and producer, with the possible exception of Morrison's some of the time, Waitrose most of the time and Costco nearly all of the time, their purchasing is traceable as they all buy locally in Britain. The rest of the bunch have screwed and glued the average British farmer and producer to the floor boards. They have almost destroyed the milk producers, made life very difficult for the pig farmers and poultry industry, when world feed prices were very high and meat produced at a loss, hence importing meat from countries with much lower management standards, still with their Sow Crates and Battery Hen cages. Their policy of CHEAP, CHEAP has forced the price of everything down so they buy when prices are down to rock bottom and all this regardless of the quality. However they still want their very healthy profit margins on top.


Now this has had a major impact on the horse meat scandal of recent weeks. If you cannot source beef for the 'value' pack and lasagne market, you are going to end up with other cheaper ingredients, i.e. horse meat, mislabelled by criminals abroad. Not the nicely bred horse steaks that grace the tables of fancy Parisian restaurants on the Champs-Élysées but those poor old knackered nags heading to slaughter houses outside Bucharest. These animals are being forced off the roads in Romania as a result of their government's traffic legislation. This low quality product, hopefully without "butte", or (buttersolergin which is an administered in this country under strict license to suffering animals), that then finds its way into the food chain here. Not that the supermarket buyers are all to blame. It is strange how the EU can enforce strict hygiene regulations which prevent the WI from selling jam in second hand jars and our food police prosecute lady helpers for producing egg sandwiches and cakes for local cricket team teas, but they are unable to stop Eastern European horse meat being passed off as beef!!

I rest my case against the stable door.

The Czech Bus Shelter – as many will know the bus shelter on the A418 crossroads was a very kind donation by the Czech government to Aston Abbotts and Wingrave and it is now in a quite bad state of repair. Funds from principally Wingrave PC and Aston Abbotts PC are to be used shortly to bring this much used building back to life.

Crime Statistics – news from the Aylesbury Vale Community Safety Partnership indicates that for the period 1st April, 2012 to end January in the main show a downward trend for our area. Burglaries 284 which is 80 less than the previous year, Theft of Vehicles 82 some 32 less than the previous year, but Theft from Vehicles was up by 34 at 620, this probably due to manufacturers making it harder to take vehicles now. Robbery was up 8 at 50, but Total Anti-Social Behaviour had virtually halved at 1674 offences – which is still a frightening statistic!!

#### VILLAGE ORCHARD

Have you taken advantage of the early Spring sunshine yet and walked round your orchard?

If you wish you could stroll round there, but just can't, then here's a quick description of what you might have found.

It looks wet - nothing has been damaged by the gales we had in December and some buds are beginning to swell. Snowdrops are flowering and some bulbs are pushing through - Spring is round the corner.

Looking very carefully a few primrose and cowslip plants were found looking very healthy and with small young plants round them so, with luck, they will spread gradually.

The one surprise I had was when I saw the number of mole hills that have been pushed up in the last few weeks. The place really is over (or under!) run with moles. In general I do not consider moles a pest in an orchard or a field but, as always, there comes a point when there are just too many. Maybe not too many moles but definitely too many molehills. The mole hills pose a problem because they affect the working of my grass 'topper' by both blunting the blades and preventing the machine from running on the level. So I must harrow the orchard to spread and level the hills, something I would rather not bother doing.

There are a few more trees to be planted as soon as possible and then we look forward to green shoots everywhere.

### ALLOTMENT DIARY

News from the allotment being a bit thin on the ground at the moment (if you'll pardon the pun), can I start by giving you a few bits of bits of garden news, which is the next best thing. The first is very close to allotment news: last year I grew some of my potatoes not in the allotment, but in my vegetable garden. I decided to try an experiment, and to leave them in the ground until I needed them, thinking that this would stop them sprouting, and help preserve the freshness of the potatoes. I therefore only picked them at the end of February. I certainly achieved both of my desired aims, but there was one unfortunate side effect, which was that some of the tubers got affected by the spell of very cold weather we had in January, and had started turning mushy. (I recognised the symptoms, having had the same thing happen last year with some potatoes which I had stored in metal dustbins in the garage). So I think the experiment was a partial success: next year I will leave some potatoes in the ground until, say, mid December, which should avoid any serious cold spells, and prevent this problem.



The second bit of garden news is the curious case of the chaffinch in the early morning. Practically every day for the last three or four weeks, between about 8.00 and 9.00 am, I have been disturbed by a continual tapping at the window by the front door. At first I wondered what on earth it was: but I now know that it is a cock chaffinch which perches on the rose bush near the window, and then keeps flying up and pecking rapidly on the window. Why it does this I do not know: but my guess is that the bird is seeing its reflection in the window, and keeps attacking it, to try to drive what it thinks is a rival male chaffinch away. (I have consulted my bird books, and while none mentions this behaviour specifically, they do mention the fact that chaffinches are territorial, and incline to be aggressive in the mating season).

Next, I turn to my poor lawn. A few months ago I mentioned that part of the lawn was being spoiled by badgers visiting the garden at night, and scraping the surface away while searching for worms. The next thing that happened was that a mole began tunnelling under the far end of the lawn, gradually moving towards the centre. At one time I had more than a dozen large molehills. We decided that we had to do something, and Adam inserted a couple of mole traps in the molehills. Unfortunately, his Labrador, Zilla, was with him when he was doing it; and either because she thought she would help, or because she could smell the moles, she dug and scrabbled furiously in a number of the molehills – so that I now have several large craters where some of the molehills were, as well as the remaining molehills. Finally, Adam acquired a new, second-hand, and very large boat. There was no room to turn the trailer carrying the boat and move it on our drive, so that he drove the car with the boat in its trailer on to the lawn. All went well until he left the car and trailer stationary, and later went out to reverse the boat to the position he wanted it – whereupon he found that the weight of the boat had made the wheels of the trailer sink into the lawn, and the attempt to move it made the driving wheels of his car whizz found without getting any purchase, making two more holes in the unfortunate lawn! (As well as the dents where the trailer wheels were, and no doubt new dents which it is causing in its present location). I now only await some pieces of meteorite landing on the lawn to make my cup of happiness run over!

The only other piece of vegetable related news is that I am still digging up artichokes from my garden. Unlike potatoes, they do not seem to be affected by cold weather, and nothing much appears to eat them. (Unlike carrots: yet again this year my crop was decimated by carrot-fly. I am at a loss to know how to keep it away – it even attacks the supposed carrot-fly resistant varieties like Resistafly and Flyaway. If any of my readers knows the answer, I shall be very glad to hear from him or her).

### Aston Abbotts Parish Council Summary of Parish Council Meeting

Wednesday 27th February 2013

Present: -

Cllrs. C Higgs (Chair), R Clarke, J Perkins, Mrs K Curry, Mrs J Hardcastle, B

Carvey, P Bruton (Clerk), and one member of the Public.

Apologies: Received from County Cllr Mrs N Glover and District Cllr P Cooper.

The Clerk reported the issue of overgrown hedgerows in the village had been referred to County Councillor N Glover who had advised the Clerk should report such instances to Bucks CC and she would provide a contact email for future reference.

We had received a note from A Muskett Ltd regarding an increase of £20 per annum to our annual street maintenance contract and it was RESOLVED to accept the quotation. A note had been received from AVDC regarding grants for lunch clubs and the papers were passed to Cllr Higgs to see if this was appropriate for the Thursday coffee mornings. It was AGREED to continue with our contribution of £20 to the Buckinghamshire Playing Fields Association.

Annual Parish Meeting: The Clerk advised that the Annual Parish meeting was scheduled for the 8<sup>th</sup> May 2013 and Councillors felt it was an important meeting that gave residents an opportunity to have their say about the direction the village takes. In particular the allocation of any Fete profits was decided at the meeting. An Agenda would be circulated and a note prepared by the Clerk for the Chronicle. It was anticipated we could use the meeting for the launch of our Village Plan.

Village Plan – Cllr Perkins reported that a very productive meeting had managed to complete a proof read of the Plan and the amendments were now being incorporated into the latest version. He was contacting Sarah Allwood to get her final thoughts and we should then be in a position to meet the target date of the Annual Parish Meeting.

Wingrave Crossroads Bus Shelter – We had received a note from the Clerk at Wingrave and a revised quote for the improvements and repair was circulated. After discussion it was RESOLVED to contribute up to £200

PA System: Cllr Perkins reported that Aylesbury Vale Housing Association were kindly donating a PA system that we would make available for village events and that he was prepared to take responsibility for it's safe keeping. The Clerk would ensure any insurance requirements were met.

LAF Meeting – Cllrs Curry and Clarke reported they had attended the recent meeting of the LAF and the main topic had been the development of Luton Airport and that the plans indicated that by 2031 they were targeting an increase of 75% in passengers handled and 40% increase in flights – the main concern was over the impact on the road infrastructure required to support the increased traffic flow given that no major works were included in the plans, particularly in respect of the A418. It was also noted that the police were promoting a product to protect machinery and equipment, up to 500 were available free to farmers, called Selecta DNA, to try to deter and reduce the amount of metal thefts in the area.

**Annual Safety Check** – A meeting had been arranged with our Safety consultants in March and it was anticipated that an arborist would carry out a survey of the trees in areas the Council is responsible for.

It was noted that the next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> April 2013 at 7:30pm in the Church Room.





There is a beautiful soul working in the US Postal Service 'dead letter office'. The article below was sent to the editor by Fred Poole with the note 'it might be for inclusion in the Chronicle?'. See what you think.

Our 14-year-old dog Abbey died last month. The day after she passed away my 4-year-old daughter Meredith was crying and talking about how much she missed Abbey. She asked if we could write a letter to God so that when Abbey got to heaven, God would recognise her. I told her that I thought we could so, and she dictated these words:

Dear God, Will you please take care of my dog? She died yesterday and is with you in heaven. I miss her very much. I'm happy that you let me have her as my dog even though she got sick. I hope you will play with her. She likes to swim and play with balls. I am sending a picture of her so when you see her you will know that she is my dog. I really miss her. Love, Meredith

The letter was put in an envelope, with a picture of Abbey & Meredith, addressed it to God/Heaven. We put our return address on it. Meredith pasted several stamps on the front of the envelope because she said it would take lots of stamps to get the letter all the way to heaven. That afternoon she dropped it into the letterbox at the post office.

A few days later, she asked if God had gotten the letter yet. I told her that I thought He had.

Yesterday, there was a package wrapped in gold paper on our front porch addressed 'To Meredith'. Inside was a book by Mr. Rogers called, 'When a Pet Dies.' Taped to the inside front cover was the letter we had written to God in its opened envelope. On the opposite page was the picture of Abbey & Meredith and this note:

Dear Meredith, Abbey arrived safely in heaven. Having the picture was a big help and I recognised her right away. Abbey isn't sick anymore. Her spirit is here with me just like it stays in your heart. Abbey loved being your dog. Since we don't need our bodies in heaven, I don't have any pockets to keep your picture in so I'm sending it back to you in this little book for you to keep and have something to remember Abbey by. Thank you for the beautiful letter and thank your mother for helping you write it and sending it to me. What a wonderful mother you have. I picked her especially for you. I send my blessings every day and remember that I love you very much. By the way, I'm easy to find. I am wherever there is love. Love, God
