

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Allotment Diary

Residents Urged To Be Vigilant

Burglary series Aylesbury Vale

Thames Valley Police is reminding residents to be vigilant following a series of burglaries in Aylesbury and the surrounding area.

Between the 26th and the 31st October there were eleven burglary-related incidents. On the 26th October, an incident occurred in Church Street, Quainton. The following day (27/10) there was a burglary in High Street, Edlesborough. On the 31st October, there were a further nine incidents. Two of these took place in High Street North, Stewkley. There were three burglaries in Aylesbury including properties in Henry Road, Meadowcroft and Weedon Road.

Other addresses affected on the 31st October include Wellcroft in Ivinghoe, Rosebery Road in Aston Clinton, Chequers Lane in Pitstone and Church Street in Wing.

Investigating officer PS Jim Forrest of Aylesbury Local CID said: "I am encouraging anyone who has any information about these incidents, or has seen anyone acting suspiciously around the Aylesbury area to get in touch by

calling the Thames Valley Police non-emergency number 101.

If you do not want to speak directly to the police you can contact the independent charity Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111 of go to www.crimestoppers-uk.org. No personal details are taken, information is not traced or recorded and you will not go to court.



To reduce the risk of further burglaries, Thames Valley Police encourages the following:

- Leave lights on within the house or have lights on dusk to dawn timers in order to make it look as though the house is occupied. As the dark winter months approach, burglars are targeting houses in darkness as it is clear nobody is inside
- Ensure all doors and windows are locked
- Lock and bolt any side gates
- Keep garden tools such as shovels and forks locked away in garages and sheds
- Do not leave jewellery, computer accessories and car keys in view of the windows
- Record serial numbers/model numbers of all electrical items
- Store jewellery in a safe place which is well hidden
- Report any suspicious vehicles, callers or door knockers to the Thames



Orchard Report 17th November, 2016

Recently I have been reflecting on the future of Agriculture – where on earth is it going and what changes will there be in the next twenty years ahead. As a boy I saw cows being milked by hand and even at the age of 24 had to regularly (once a day) hand milk a Hereford cow myself.

This autumn Alex and I have watched a robotic milker at work. The cows, of their own accord, walked into a milking stall where automation took over. The cows' teats were washed, the milking units were put on and the cow was fed. When the milk flow stopped, off came the milkers or teat cups, the udder was disinfected and the doors opened for the cow to walk out – all with no one in attendance. We have all heard of satellite navigation on combine harvesters, but this weekend I think I heard the ultimate. We met up with an old farmer friend from Kent who as usual had been helping out the big farmers on Romney Marsh with harvest. Henry was grain carting he drove a huge tractor and trailer



along the roads to the harvest.

Once in the field Henry sat back, took his hands off the steering wheel and his feet off the pedals.

The man in the combine then took over by remote control so that the tractor drew alongside the combine and 10 tons of grain was unloaded from the moving, working combine into the trailer all automatically. Henry just sat in the seat and watched it all happen. Whatever next! I really can't imagine.

I realise that I am a dinosaur, someone who still likes to do work by my own hand, using what's left of my own muscle power and my own skills and thereby gaining satisfaction from a completed task – terribly old fashioned, I know, but I wonder what satisfaction is to be had where machines do all the

work. Then follows on, where will we be in 20 years time and where will we derive our satisfaction in life? Surely one of the mistakes we have made is in making so many people travel so far to work. How can a man drive half way round the M25 each day to and from work and call his life satisfying I will never know.

I recently visited the village where I grew up and went school – my father being Headmaster. We lived right next to the school. My father was part of the village day in, day out, socialising with parents and seeing the 200 children at weekends as well as in school

hours. Today the Headmistress lives basically in London and travels 1 or 2 hours each morning to work depending on the traffic. The school has built on a hall and classrooms, has the same number of teachers but only 40 pupils. No doubt a very good school, but at what cost.

I think myself lucky that I grew up in the 1950s-60s, that I never had to travel to work and that my life was spent outdoors with plenty of exercise. So much to be thankful for, as the great old hymn says "Change and decay all around I see".

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Broadband Latest

UPDATE ON THE PROBLEM OF POOR BROADBAND SERVICE IN THE VILLAGE

Thanks to all those who responded to my original email. I received 25 replies (20% of those registered for the village Post Box). Of these 5 were happy with their broadband performance (one of whom had a dedicated line for their computer) and 20 were, like me, very unhappy. Particular thanks to Phil Spooner who updated me on the feedback we get from District Councillor Peter Cooper who reports to the Parish Council on BT progress. Phil also made some useful suggestions as to how I could improve my broadband performance with my current BT facilities.

This has been a voyage of discovery. When I started my investigations the broadband performance in my house averaged around 4Mbps (download) with a wide range (from 1 to 7Mbps). I was paying for a BT Standard Broadband package that claimed to deliver 8.5 to 9.5Mbps. BT declined to provide the latest version of their hub so I reluctantly bought a new one. There was no noticeable improvement. The only way I could get anything close to the claimed performance was to place the computer next to the hub. So I bought an Ethernet cable which allows the BT hub to be connected direct to the computer wherever it is in the house and finally I was getting a consistent 8.5Mbps. I bought a cable for each of our two computers (a laptop and a desktop) and for the sake of domestic harmony I have now installed the cables (under floorboards, through ceilings and walls) so that they are less obtrusive. So now the location of the computer and distance from the hub are irrelevant (one of the cables is 15m long). My wife's Tablet still does not have a reliable internet connection in the house but is at least easily portable to a usable 'hot spot'.

A recent Watchdog TV programme looked into the same problem which is experienced by many broadband customers and suggested that interference from phones and TVs might be causing some of the lost performance

between hub and computer. They drew attention to the fact that in order to claim a particular performance a supplier only has to show that 10% of customers receive the claimed level. In other circumstances BT could be sued under the trades' description laws!

The TV presenter suggested that the rules need to be changed so that in order to charge for provision of facilities the supplier should have to ensure that say 90% of customers get the claimed level of performance. Then the supplier will only have to deal with complaints from 10% of customers rather than the present 90%!! BT claims that 80% of customers get the level of performance (not according to my data on Aston Abbotts).

So I have a temporary solution applicable to my household but we don't download films or play computer games, so 8.5Mbps is adequate.

On their website BT state that for my postcode:

'Your cabinet is enabled for Superfast fibre however you're not able to order fibre just yet. This might be because the length of the line is too long to get Superfast speeds. We're actively looking at other options. If you'd like us to let you know if fibre becomes available, register your details.'

BT undertakes to let you know by email when their BT Infinity product (which needs a superfast link) will be available for your household. I have been registered for well over a year and have heard nothing.

What this means is that BT have no plans to introduce a superfast (fibre) connection to the village and we are stuck with copper wire standard broadband for the foreseeable future. The estimate for when superfast will be brought to the village has been moving steadily backwards and is currently 2018 but even this date is 'subject to change'.

I will monitor the information provided to the Parish Council by Peter Cooper and ensure BT are aware of our feelings on the subject. Keep me up to date with your experience/feelings on the subject.

Iffy Wi-Fi

The majority of people living in the main part of the village should be able to get at least 6 to 8 megabits of broadband speed. Unfortunately those living in the Northern and Western reaches of the village are at a geographic disadvantage.

6 to 8 Mb/s (megabits per second) is fast enough to allow you to watch high-definition movies or BBC iPlayer without pausing or interruption.


David Gray's experience described on page 23 is not unusual. BT are getting the broadband to his house, but the distribution within the house was causing poor connections and poor speeds.

Quite often the culprit here is reliance upon a Wi-Fi wireless connection, as in David's case.

Wi-Fi is a weak radio signal which is used to provide wireless connection between your Tablet, laptop, or phone and your broadband router which connects to the telephone line. Because it is a weak signal it is easily blocked.

The first thing to do is to check what speed broadband is actually arriving at your router. This is done using a broadband speed checker. Open up your browser - Internet Explorer, Chrome or Firefox - and go to www.broadbandspeedchecker.co.uk. Run the speed test.

Here is a picture of the broadband speed test running on my PC:



Living on the south side of the village I get a decent speed. My supplier is BT Broadband and my PC is connected to my router with a short Ethernet cable. The difference between the download and upload speed is normal.

If you are getting less than 6 megabits then it's worth investigating further.

If your computer is connected to the router with an Ethernet cable, then note the speed and contact your broadband supplier to ask if that is all you should get.

If you are using a Wi-Fi connection to your computer or tablet then move the device very close to your broadband router. Now run the speed test again to see if it has improved. If that does not improve it try



connecting your device using an Ethernet cable (not usually possible with phones or tablets). Try the test again. If you now manage to achieve speeds of 6-8 megabits then it is the Wi-Fi which is at fault.

Wi-Fi signals are easily blocked by walls. If it's not possible for you to run a cable to your computer from your router, as David has done, then two possible options are available to you; one is the use of a Wi-Fi booster (for phones and tablets) and the other is using network powerline adaptors which transfer the network signal over your household mains wiring (for PCs and laptops). Try searching Amazon for 'Wi-Fi Booster' or 'Network Powerline Adapter'. I've not tried a Wi-Fi booster myself, but I have used the network powerline adaptors with great success.

Of course this still won't provide the performance that we all anticipate and need from a superfast fibre connection, but standard broadband *should* be reliable and reasonably fast. However, if you are relying upon an iffy Wi-Fi signal then when that long-promised fibre connection finally arrives it may not actually bring you the speed increase which you are anticipating.

The Lie by Helen Dunmore

The Lie is set during and after the First World War. It is a story about a young man, Daniel, who returns to Cornwall having survived the atrocities of trench warfare. He finds himself homeless and without family. An old friend of his mother allows him to live in a shack on her small plot of land.

Daniel is haunted by the death of his best friend, Frederick. Of course, he is suffering from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder or "shell-shock" as it was known then.

The old lady, Mary Pascoe, falls ill and persuades Daniel to let her die at home and be buried on her own land. When Mary does die, Daniel tells noone and so the lies begin and inevitably, we see the disintegration of Daniel's sanity.

Helen Dunmore uses such beautiful language that in spite of the tragic circumstances and traumas, it is a book that is hard to put down.

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


