John Bercow Re-elected as our MP



Speaker of the House of
Commons John Bercow romped
home with the lion's share of
the votes in the **Buckingham constituency.** Parliamentary
convention means that none of
main parties stand against the
speaker in Buckingham. But in
this campaign Mr Bercow faced
competition from UKIP, Green
Party and Independent
candidates. Mr Bercow started
his political life as a
Conservative MP but in his role
as Speaker is politically neutral

and not affiliated with any party. He has held the Buckingham seat since 1997. He became Speaker in 2009. Many voters have expressed their dissatisfaction with the system, which effectively takes away their democratic right to vote for the party of their choice. Turnout was 68.64%.

Bercow said, ".... it is my commitment to report to my colleagues the very large number of spoiled ballot papers, expressions of discontent. And to ask whether they think a better arrangement could be put in place." The results: John Bercow: 34,299 Green Party, Michael Sheppard: 8,574 Independent, Scott Raven: 5,638 UKIP, Brian Mapletoft: 4,162.



Following the meeting they visited the pub for their regular drink and was told to leave the pub as they were barred. The now ex-customers have written a very public response asking other locals to support them with their feet effectively asking them to avoid the pub. It appears the pub has not responded.





ALLOTMENT DIARY

The battle with the Gallant Soldier Weed

As I write this, we are in the middle of the longest heatwave since 1976 – and, working on my allotment, I can believe it. Having had 2 weeks in France at the end of May, and left the allotment with hardly a weed in sight, I returned to a veritable explosion of weeds. And have been trying to get on top of the problem ever since – especially as I am going away again this coming weekend for another week's holiday! The only good thing about weeding in this weather is that when you have pulled a weed up, it stays pulled up!

I mentioned last year that my allotment had been invaded by a

"Gallant Soldier". It is back again this year, and is now my most common weed. It clearly thrives on disturbed soils: about 60% of the weeds around my potatoes are gallant soldiers: whereas it is much less prevalent among my onions — where one does not disturb the soil so much when planting. Again there are some allotments which have not received much attention this year, and the weed seems to be totally absent from them.

Curiously, however, I have spoken both to Gordon Kemp and Simon Guy, who each have allotments within 50yards of mine, and they say they do not know the weed at all. The only explanation I can come up with is that each of them is a more efficient gardener than and perhaps thev remove the gallant soldier weeds when they are too small to be recognised. I know it has been in Aston Abbotts for a long time - having escaped from Kew Gardens in the 1860s. it gradually been spreading out from there like ripples on a pond. It was Peter Knight who identified it for me, having himself had it identified for him by the late Vic Scott.

On a happier note most of my crops seem to be thriving: potatoes, beetroot, onions, mangetout, French beans and courgettes: and especially carrots: I shall be picking a record crop, which will be very pleasant after last year's disaster. only disappointments The been parsnips – as always: I think I must mistakenly pick out the young parsnips, thinking they are weeds. (Next year I will leave all the weeds alone along the line of parsnip seeds until the parsnips leaves are big enough to be recognised) - and also sweetcorn. The plants I raised

in the greenhouse are doing well, but about one half of the seeds Adam planted directly into the ground failed to germinate. Adam thinks he put them in too late. However, one of the sweetcorn plants has clearly been nibbled by something: perhaps a rabbit. It is possible that the just missing sweetcorn was eaten by rabbits as soon as the plants popped their heads above ground. I did see some evidence of rabbit activity on the allotments in the spring.

Meanwhile in the garden I have had an excellent crop of strawberries, and will clearly have a bumper crop of gooseberries and plums: and in my greenhouse my tomatoes are doing well, as is my cucumber; and my peppers are growing well, but I perhaps put them in too late. I shall be lucky to get any peppers before the autumn at the earliest.

Still, over all, everything is on the tickety side of boo, and I think 2017 is going to be a good year from a gardening point of view (Provided this heatwave does not go on much longer, and we get some rain!)

Police advice issued following theft – Aylesbury Vale

Police have been investigating reports received, of two men attending addresses in Aylesbury Vale purporting to be delivering leaflets.

Police have been investigating reports received during the month of May and early June, of two men attending addresses in the villages and towns to the north of Aylesbury Vale purporting to be delivering leaflets.

Residents have raised concerns that mail and other items have been stolen from their letter boxes following these visits. Of particular focus has been properties with letter boxes located on external walls or gateways.

Witnesses describe two men, both black and in their 20s wearing fluorescent jackets, driving a white, Vauxhall Corsa derived van. Investigating Officer Det Con Lucie Roberts from Aylesbury police station said, "We're grateful to the residents of Aylesbury Vale who have contacted us with their concerns about these leaflet posters.

"I'd encourage anyone who may have seen them during the last few weeks, or has information about their activity, to please call us on 101.

"Personal details taken through mail box theft can be used for fraudulent activity. It is always advisory to check your accounts or credit sources to ensure all is in order."

Police have the following information for anyone concerned about unsolicited callers attending their property:

- make sure your back door is locked before answering the front door
- use a door chain when opening the door
- ask for identification and check it carefully before letting anyone in
- ask them to come back when someone else is at home with you
- direct people asking for help to a nearby shop or other

- public place, don't let them in
- keep all valuables and keys out of sight and out of reach of doors and windows
- don't leave spare keys in obvious places such as under doormats or plant pots
- consider joining or forming a Neighbourhood Watch scheme

In the case of letter box security:

- don't leave keys in mailbox locks
- allow letters to fall through the letter box and avoid collecting them in cages attached to the door.
- if you are away for a number of days, consider asking a neighbour to collect newspapers/letters from your mailbox during your absence

The weather is hot and sunny and door and windows are understandably being left open.

This is a quick reminder to double check your premise when you are going out, or going to bed. Make sure all accessible windows and doors are shut and locked. It's easy to miss one or forget, but this could be the invite an opportunist criminal needs.

If you are enjoying your garden, make sure there aren't any accessible windows open at the front. It's easy for someone to reach in and take valuables.

operation in Aylesbury on Saturday night (17/6).

The operation, which took place in Walton Street, Aylesbury, between 7pm and 11.30pm.and formed part of Thames Valley Police's Summer Drink Drive Campaign.

It was led by Roads Policing officers from the Hampshire and Thames Valley Joint Operations Unit and officers from the Special Constabulary. In total, 105 vehicles were stopped and their drivers breathalysed resulting in five arrests for drink driving.

These were four men aged 22,23,42 and 52 and one woman, aged 36. All five were later charged with drink driving and released on bail to appear in court next month.

In addition to the arrests, five vehicles were also seized for document offences, four drivers were reported to court for various traffic offences and 12 traffic offence notices were issued which resulted in a fine and potential penalty points, depending on the offence.

Roads Policing officer Sergeant
Tom Smith, who coordinated
Saturday's operation, said: "Drink
driving pose a significant risk to
public safety with around 1,300
people across the UK being killed
or seriously injured each year in
accidents involving motorists
under the influence of alcohol."

"We will continue to conduct these operations both during and after the summer campaign and any driver caught faces an obligatory disqualification of at least a year."

Make sure you don't invite opportunist criminals




Please take a moment to ensure opportunist criminals don't have easy access to your belongings:-

- If you are in your back garden make sure that all windows and doors at the front of your home are secured. It only takes a moment someone to reach in, or climb in and steal easily accessible items.
- Make sure you don't leave handbags, mobiles, keys etc near to an open window.
- When you go to bed take a moment to double check all your doors and windows are secure, especially easily accessed ones.
- Make sure your garden tools and equipment are locked away in a shed and are marked as belonging to you.
- Don't leave out ladders that could be used to access a 1st floor window. Chain them up.

- Lock bicycles away.
- If you are going away, tell a trusted neighbour and ask them to keep an eye on your property.
- Report anyone acting suspiciously to the police on 101, or if you think a crime is in progress dial on 999

Following some of these simple precautions will reduce the opportunities for thieves.






Book Club News


